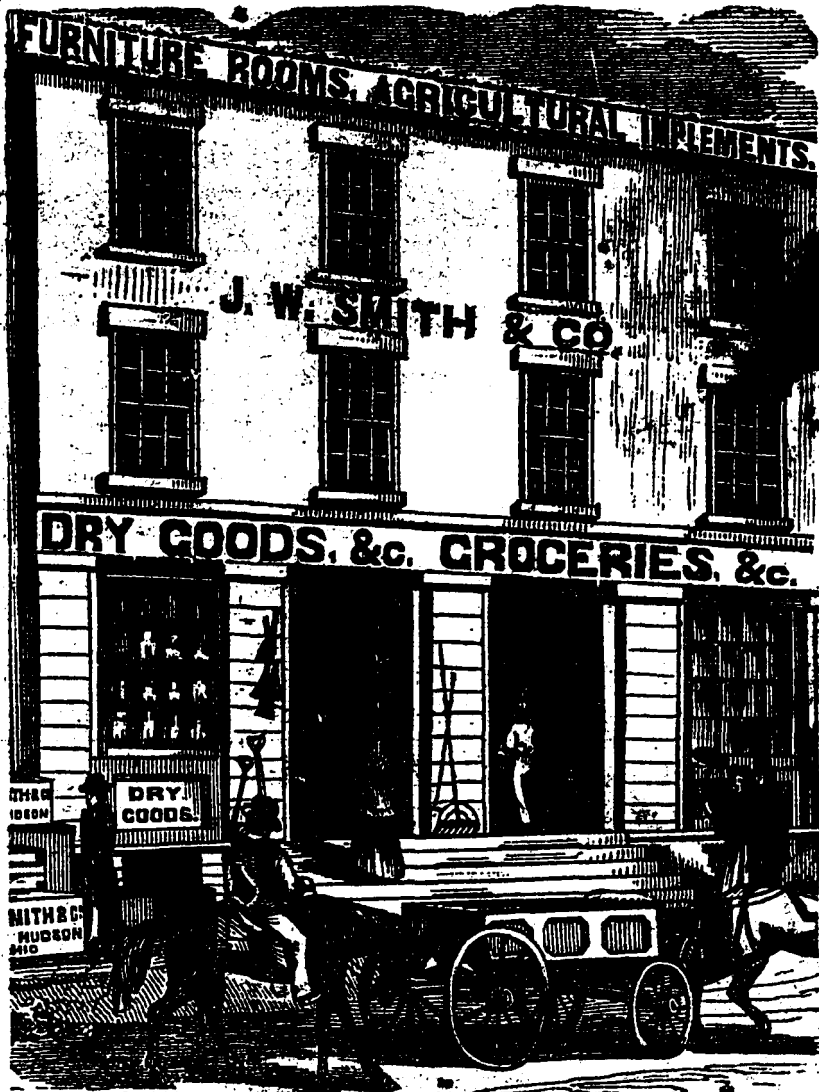




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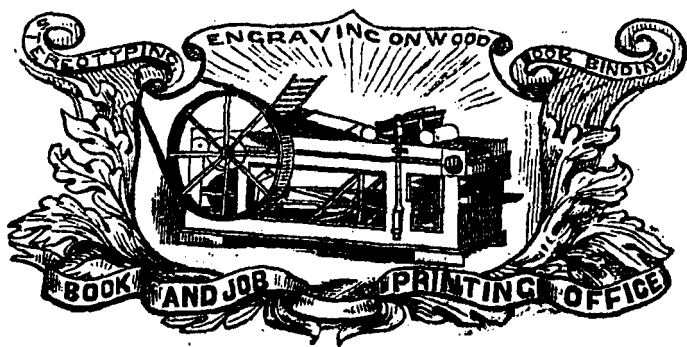
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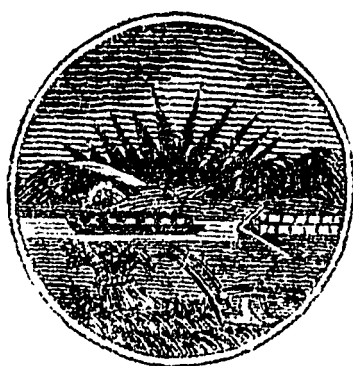

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## Publisher's Notice.

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THE frequent and almost constant want of just such information as is herein contained, suggested to the publishers the propriety of collecting the materials for such a work. Supposing the wants of others similar to their own, and confident that any labor in supplying that want, would be duly appreciated, they have calculated on large demands for it, and by issuing large editions, they can afford them at rates proportionably low. It is believed that this kind of information varied from year to year, with the increasing population and prosperity of this part of the state, will prove a useful medium in facilitating business and social intercourse between the several parts of the Reserve, and that it will be a welcome visitant both to the business office, and the drawing room.

## The Editor to the People of the Reserve.

IN a brief announcement made some months ago, we promised to present you, so far as was in our power, a complete "REGISTER of the persons ministering to the *Political, Educational, and Ecclesiastical* interests of the RESERVE. We now appear before you to redeem that promise, too sensible, however, that in many respects we must fail to answer your expectations. Some of the promised statistics we could not complete to our satisfaction. The times of Court Sessions are not yet determined. The list of Corporate Companies are not complete, and even the professions are not all represented; and in the matter given there are doubtless errors, arising from illegible returns and other causes. The merest glance at the nature of the matter contained will show it to be a work claiming a good degree of indulgence for slight errors or deficiencies, at least until we have had the full benefit of your aid in correcting them.

But while we ask indulgence for incompleteness in some respects, in others we have more than fulfilled our engagement. In the *general and state* departments, Post Office and Mail routes, our REGISTER is particularly full and satisfactory. The *Ecclesiastical* statistics we believe to be full and correct so far as respects all the leading denominations. There may be occasionally churches, unassociated with ordinary church organizations, which have escaped the vigilance of our agents, but such oversights we believe to be rare, as we have taken especial pains to make that department complete.

The same may be said in regard to the *Educational* department. All the leading Institutions are given and correctly, and a goodly list we have, which speaks well for the standard of literary and scientific attainment among us. But as these statistics were returned early in autumn, there may be some changes not reported.

It was not designed to make the *Calendar* a prominent part of this work, but still it seemed so appropriate a place for one, that we have introduced it, and have spared no pains to adapt it especially to the territory in which it is intended to circulate. The Astronomical calculations are corrected for the latitude and longitude of the *Observatory at Hudson*, viz: 41 deg., 14 m., 42 sec. north, and 81 deg., 24 m., 54 sec. west, or 5 h-55 m. 39,6 sec west in time from the meridian of Greenwich. The variations for different parts of the Reserve will be too slight to be regarded. The appointments in the calendar pages will be found convenient and suggestive.

The Editor desires furthermore to express his thanks to the heads of departments at Washington and Columbus, to the Auditors and Clerks of the several counties and townships, and to his many correspondents and contributors, to whose kindness the work is indebted for a great part of its value. A continuance of these favors is respectfully solicited. It can hardly be expected that a work of this kind in its first appearance should be wholly free from errors. It can be corrected only by your aid. It is therefore earnestly requested that County Auditors, township Clerks, Secretaries of Corporate Institutions and Ministers of the several Churches, noting inaccuracies or deficiencies herein, that they communicate them to the editor or publishers, before the first of September next, at which time it is proposed to commence the labor of revision for the following year, provided there should seem to be a demand for the continuance of the work.

The labor of collecting and arranging these statistics has been to us a work of no small degree of interest; for though endeavoring to Register only organizations and the persons representing them, one is brought into constant contact with the *resources* of a great and growing country. Here the rough hand of toil perseveringly evolves from the inland farm abundant harvests, and there the counting-room is equally prolific of great schemes of trade, evolved from the laboring brain of its occupants. The office, the studio, and the manufactory, exhibit the same constant activity, and works of public improvement and convenience are everywhere pushed on with a wonderful energy. The long list of corporate companies, for educational, manufacturing, and other purposes, will suggest enough of the activity with which these works are carried on, to convey a

lasting rebuke to any who may be disposed to remain a drone, in such a hive.

Our annual now before you is intended as a kind of index to what we are doing, as well as to what we are. And hoping it may subserve some useful end, until we have opportunity to serve you more satisfactorily,

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## Phenomena.

### MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

Venus will be evening star until July 21, then morning star to the end of the year. Mars will be morning star until January 24, then evening star during the remainder of the year. Jupiter will be the morning star until May 8, then evening star until Nov. 25, then morning star the rest of the year. Saturn will be evening star until April 27, then morning star until August 9, then evening star the remainder of the year.

### MOTIONS, ETC., OF THE PLANETS.

Venus will retrograde, this year, from the 28th of June to August 11th. This planet will be visible in the day-time during the month of June, when it will be east of the sun. Mars will retrograde until March 4th, when its motion becomes direct, or from west to east. Jupiter will retrograde from March 10th, to July 10th, during which time it will have gone back to the west, (*apparently*) nearly  $10^{\circ}$ . At this time Jupiter will be in the constellation Libra, and near the middle of it. Saturn will retrograde from the 31st of August to the end of the year. This planet may be found this year about the middle of Aries. Uranus will retrograde until January 9th, and from August 14th to the end of the year. Uranus, during the most of this year, will be in the first part of the constellation Aries, a little east of Saturn.

The moon will run highest this year December 26, at which time it will be in the 12th degree of Gemini, and have a declination of  $24^{\circ} 7' 30.6''$  north. It will run lowest Dec 12, to the 13th degree of Sagittarius, where it will have a declination of  $24^{\circ} 7' 53.8''$  south.

## ECLIPSES.

There will be six eclipses this year—three of the sun, and three of the moon, two of the latter visible on the Reserve.

I. Tuesday and Wednesday, January 6 and 7, total of the moon. Begins 10 h., 55 m., 2 a., evening, and ends 2 h., 33 m., 2 a., mean time at Hudson.

II. January 21, partial of the sun—invisible.

III. June 17, partial of the sun—invisible.

IV. July 1, total of the moon—invisible.

V. December 10, total of the sun—invisible.

VI. Sabbath morning, Dec. 26, partial of the moon. Begins 6 h., 7, 6 m., morning—visible till it sets. Magnitude, 8, 12 digits on Southern limb.

## V. CONGRESS.

THE Congress of the United States consists of a Senate and House of Representatives, and must assemble at least once every year, on the first Monday of December, unless it is otherwise provided by law.

The Senate is composed of two members from each State; and, of course, the regular number is now 62. They are chosen by the Legislatures of the several States, for the term of six years, one-third of them being elected biennially.

The Vice-President of the United States is the President of the Senate, in which body he has only a casting vote, which is given in case of an equal division of the votes of the Senators. In his absence, a President *pro tempore* is chosen by the Senate.

Since the 4th of March, 1817, the compensation of each member of the Senate and House of Representatives has been \$8 a day, during the period of his attendance in Congress, without deduction in case of sickness; and \$3 for every twenty miles' travel, in the usual road, in going to and returning from the seat of government. The com-

pensation of the President of the Senate *pro tempore*, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, is \$16 a day.

Members marked "U." were elected as "Union men," and those marked "S. R.," on the "States' Rights" issue.

Both the Senators from Mississippi have tendered their resignations—Jefferson Davis unconditionally, and Henry S. Foote, to take effect on the 8th January.

The vacancy in the California delegation is consequent upon the failure of the Legislature to choose a succession to John C. Fremont, Dem., whose term of service expired on the 3d of March last. The Legislature of that State, recently elected, will meet in January, when a member will be chosen to fill the vacancy, who will be able to take his seat by the 1st of March.

The vacancy in the Connecticut delegation was caused by the failure to choose a successor to Roger S. Baldwin, Whig, whose term of service expired on the 3d of March last. Upon the new Legislature to be elected in April next, will devolve the duty of filling the vacancy.

#### HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE THIRTY-SECOND CONGRESS,

*Which will expire on the 3d of March, 1853.*

The House of Representatives is composed of members from the several states, elected by the people for the term of two years. The Representatives are apportioned among the different States according to population. The thirty-second Congress is chosen according to the act of Congress of 1842, the ratio being "one Representative for every 70,680 persons in each State, and one additional Representative for each State having a fraction greater than one moiety of the said ratio, computed according to the rule prescribed by the Constitution of the United States." The law of 1842 also requires, that the Representatives of each State "shall be elected by *districts* composed of contiguous territory, equal in number to the number of Representatives to which said State may be entitled, no one district electing more than one Representative." The present number of

representatives is 233, and there are 4 delegates, one each from Oregon, Minnesota, Utah, and New Mexico, who have a right to speak, but not to vote.\* The first regular session of the 32d commenced on the 1st of December, 1851. The numbers attached to the names show the Districts in each State from which the members were chosen.

We have classed the above according to their known partizan affinities, although some of those not specially designated as Free Soilers

were chosen by the coalition with one or other of the old parties. We have marked as Free Soilers those only who were elected as such. On the other hand some of those marked as Union, or Southern Rights men, were the regular nominees of one or the other of the old parties, although supported by many because of their peculiar position upon the Compromise Measures, irrespective of party affinities.

REVENUES, EXPENDITURES, &c., FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1851

The aggregate receipts to the Treasury of the U. S. for the last fiscal year amount to \$82,312,979 87, which, with balance on hand gave as available means for the year \$58,917,524 36. *Expenditures* for the year are \$48,005,878 68.

IMPORTS for the year ending June 30th, 1851, are \$215,725,995. Of which there were in specie \$4,927,901. EXPORTS for the same period, \$217,517,130, as follows:

Domestic products, \$178,546,555. Foreign goods re-exported, \$9,738,695. Specie, \$29,213,880.

The values of domestic exports for the last fiscal year, compared with the previous year, exhibit an increase of \$43,646,322. The value of our exports of breadstuffs and provisions has fallen from \$68,701,921 in 1837, to \$26,052,373 in 1850, and \$21,943,653 in 1851, with a strong probability of a still further reduction the current year. The exports in rice and tobacco show an aggregate decrease of \$1,156,751 as compared with last year.

The excess of exported over imported specie the past year is \$24,263,99. During the first quarter of the present fiscal year the amount exported is \$14,651,827. Should this rate continue the drain during the year will amount to \$58,607,308.

The expenditure of the War Department for the year ending 30th June last, were \$9,060,268 58. The estimates for the year commencing 1st July next are \$7,898,775 83.

The estimates for the Navy and Marine Corps the ensuing year are \$5,856,472 19; the current year, \$5,900,621.

The payments upon the public debts since the 1st of December, exclusive of interest, amount to \$7,501,456 54; which, however, includes \$3,242,400 paid Mexico, \$2,591,213 45 of awards to American citizens under the late treaty with Mexico.

The *public debt*, exclusive of stock authorized to be issued to Texas, is \$62,560,395 26.

The receipts for the next fiscal year are estimated at \$51,800,000, and available means at \$63,258,743 09.

The total expenditures for the same period are estimated at \$42,892,299,19.

At the close of the last fiscal year the length of mail routes within the United States was 196,290 miles; annual transportation thereon, 53,272,252 miles; annual cost of such transportation, \$3,421,754.—The estimated length of the foreign mail routes is 18,349 miles; annual transportation thereon, 616,205 miles; cost \$1,474,187

The increased transportation within the United States, exclusive of Oregon and California, during the past year, is 6,162,855 miles; in annual cost, \$547,110.

The whole number of Post Offices in the United States, on the 30th day of June last, was 19,796. There were 1,698 post offices established, and 256 discontinued during the past year.

The gross revenue of the Department for the fiscal year, exclusive of foreign postage, is \$6,727,866,78. Expenditure for the same period, \$6,024,566,79. Balance \$703,299,99. The receipts for postage during the year, exclusive of foreign postage, are \$6,345,747,21, being an increase of \$997,610,79 upon the preceding year.

# Government of the State of Ohio.

## EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

THE Executive Department consists of a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, and Attorney-General chosen by the electors of the State, and continuing in office two years, except the Auditor whose term is four years from the second Monday in January 1852.

"The Governor shall have power to grant pardons, &c., for all crimes and offences, except treason and cases of impeachment, but shall report each case to the Assembly, and his reasons therefor. In case of the death or removal of the Governor, the duties of the office shall devolve upon the Lieutenant Governor; after him, upon the President of the Senate, and after him upon the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The Lieutenant-Governor shall be President of the Senate. If the office of Auditor, Treasurer, Secretary, or Attorney-General becomes vacant, from disability, death, or removal, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the disability is removed or a successor is elected and qualified. But the vacancy shall be filled at the first general election that occurs more than thirty days after it happens, and the person then elected shall hold office for the full term.—*Constitution.*

## GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

THE LEGISLATIVE POWER of the State is vested in a General Assembly, consisting of a Senate and House of Representatives; the members of which are chosen by the electors of the State on the second Tuesday of October.

Term of office to continue two years from the first day of January following.

"Senators and Representatives shall be chosen biennially, in districts, on the 2d Tuesday of October, and their term shall commence on the 1st of January following. Members must be residents of their respective districts, one year next preceding the election, unless absent on the public business of the State, or of the United States. No person convicted of embezzling public funds, or who shall be in any way concerned in a duel, shall hold office; nor shall any person holding public money have a seat in the Assembly until he has paid the same into the Treasury. Any two members may call for the yeas and nays, and on the passage of every bill, in either house, the vote shall be taken by yeas and nays, and entered on the journal, and no law shall be passed in either house, without a majority vote of all the members elected thereto. Members shall have the usual privileges of speech, and from arrest. No member shall, during his term and for one year after, be eligible to any office which is created or the pay of which is increased during his term."—*Constitution.*

### JUDICIARY.

The Judicial power of the State is vested in a Supreme Court, in district Courts, Courts of Common Pleas, Courts of Probate, and Justices of the Peace, with such other courts, inferior to the Supreme Court, in one or more counties, as the General Assembly may, from time to time, establish.

### COURTS.

The Supreme Court consists of five judges chosen by the electors of the state. A majority of these judges is necessary to form a quorum, or to pronounce a decision. The Court has original jurisdiction in quo warranto, mandamus, habeas corpus, and procedendo, and such appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by law. It holds at least one term in each year, at the seat of government, and such other courts at the seat of government, or elsewhere, as may be provided by law. The Judges elect for the first court are

### COMMON PLEAS.

The State is divided into nine common pleas districts, each of which, if containing three or more counties, is divided into three parts.

Each of these subdivisions elects one judge of the court of Common Pleas, and one or more of these judges hold courts in every county in the district. The jurisdiction of these courts, times of session, &c., are yet to be determined by law. The Districts as now apportioned are as follows:

THE SUPERIOR COURT of Cleveland, and the Superior and Commercial Courts of Cincinnati, are to be discontinued. In the former, no suits are to be commenced after the second Monday in August 1852; in the latter the second Monday in February 1853.

THE DISTRICT COURTS having like original jurisdiction with the Supreme Court, and such appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by law, are composed of the Judges of the Courts of Common Pleas of the respective districts with one of the Supreme Court, any three of whom form a quorum. Courts are held in each county at least once in each year unless otherwise provided by law.

[For judges see Supreme and Common Pleas courts.]

A PROBATE COURT is established in each county as a court of record, open at all times, and holden by one Judge, elected by the voters of the county.

The Court has jurisdiction in probate and testamentary matters, the appointment of administrators and guardians, the settlement of the accounts of executors, administrators and guardians, and such jurisdiction in habeas corpus, the issuing of marriage licences, and the sale of lands by executors, administrators and guardians as may be provided by law.

During the year, \$35,768.38 of the domestic bonds have been redeemed and cancelled. The irreducible stock, upon which the State pays six per cent. interest to the townships and districts from which the funds were received, forms a part of the State debt which is not to be repaid. The surplus revenues amounting to \$2,007,260.34, and loaned to the fund commissioners of counties, of which sum \$1,016,226.53 has been already repaid, was due to the State, January 1st, 1850, except certain balances not due until 1852. After the money becomes due, if not paid, the counties must pay six per cent. interest on what remains in their hands. The State owns \$3,011,858.71 of turnpike, railway, and canal stock. The gross income of the public works for the year 1850, was \$728,085.73. The total value of taxable property, real and personal, in the State, for the year 1850, was \$43,9876,340, upon which the State tax was \$1,413,830.42. The following table exhibits the present revenue of the State as compared with the former tax laws.

**OHIO LUNATIC ASYLUM, COLUMBUS.**—S. H. Smith, Superintendent.—Number in the Asylum November 15, 1849, 323; 169 males and 154 females; received during the year, 193; 112 males, and 81 females. Whole number treated, 676; 281 males, 235 females. Discharged during the year, 198; 108 males and 90 females; of these 99, 49 males and 50 females, were recovered; 9, 5 males and 4 females, were much improved; 15 were improved; 53 unimproved (43 of the 53 were chronic cases); and 22 died.

**OHIO PENITENTIARY.**—Laurin Dewey, Warden. The number of prisoners, November 30, 1849, was 336. Number admitted during the year, 193. Whole number during the year, 529. Of these there have been discharged, by expiration of sentence, 42; by pardon, 32; by death, 21; by writ of error, 5; by pardon from President of the United States, 2; escaped, 3; in all, 105. Number in confinement, November 30, 1850, 424. Of the 192, 145 were committed for offences against property, including burglary, larceny, counterfeiting, horse-stealing, &c., 7 for arson, 13 for forgery, and 32 for offences against life or the person. The receipts of the prison for the year were \$35,740.74. Expenses, \$26,877.56. Balance in favor of the prison, \$8,863.18. There is a library connected with the prison, for the use of the convicts, of nearly 8,000 volumes.

**DEAF AND DUMB ASYLUM, COLUMBUS.**—H. N. Hubbell, Superintendent. The asylum has been in actual operation 21 years, during which time there have been 462 pupils. Terms of admission \$100 for session of ten months, payable quarterly in advance, which covers all expenses but clothing, travelling, and physicians' bills in case of sickness. Session commences October 1st. Vacation from August 1, to October 1, during which time board at the asylum is \$1.25 per week.

**INSTITUTION FOR THE BLIND, COLUMBUS.**—George McMillen, Superintendent. The number including graduates and assistants in this institution was December 25, 1850, 73; 40 males and 33 females. The oldest was 38 years, and the youngest 8; average  $18\frac{2}{3}$  years. 48 were under 21, and 25 over 21, and 25 over 21. 13 new pupils were received during the year, and 10 were discharged. Applicants for admission must be between the ages of 6 and 21. If able to pay, the charges are \$100, for the 10 months' session, exclusive of clothing, and traveling expenses. Session is from October 1, to August 1.

**STATISTICS OF CRIME.**—From the report of the Attorney-General it

appears that during the year 1850, there were 2,008 prosecutions; 1,273 convictions, and 295 acquittals. The punishments were—Penitentiary, for life, 3; for 10 years and over, 6; under 10 years, 118. County Jail, 221. The amount of fines was \$14,224.58; of costs, \$19,290.60; of collectable costs, \$9,076.08.

## History.

A REGISTER OF THE RESERVE would hardly be completed, without an accompanying sketch of its early history. We therefore append, to the exclusion of other matter, intended for these pages, a few extracts from a highly interesting sketch of the "Location, Settlement and Progress of the City of Cleveland," by Charles Whittlesey Esq. The article appeared in the American Pioneer, in 1843. but we are gratified to know that it is now, in connection with several other essays by the same author, in the hands of his publishers, and will shortly appear in a neat volume, and entitled, Fugitive Essays, by Charles Whittlesey, to which we refer our readers for fuller details than our limits will admit of. We select only such parts as refer to the Reserve generally.

### A SKETCH OF THE LOCATION, SETTLEMENT, AND PROGRESS OF THE CITY OF CLEVELAND.

*American Pioneer, Vol. 2, No. 1, January, 1843.*

After the war of the revolution, the British refused to yield possession of the lake country west of the Cuyahoga, and occupied to its shores until 1790. Their traders had a house in Ohio City, standing north of the Detroit Road on the point of the hill near the river, when the surveyors first arrived there. By the treaty of Greenville (May, 1795,) the western Indians, defeated at Wayne's battle the season previous, relinquished all claim to the lands east of the Cuyahoga, the Portage and the Muskingum as low down as Fort Laurens, which is near Bolivar, in Tuscarawas county. At a council, held in Buffalo in 1796, by General Cleveland and the representatives of the Six Nations, the latter people gave the whites peaceable possession of that part of the Reserve east of this river. It thus remained the line of partition between the white and the red men until July 4, 1805, when the general government extinguished the Indian title to the remainder of the Reserve, by treaty.

When the first county north-west of the Ohio was erected (July 27, 1788) the Cuyahoga was a part of its western boundary, and the lake its northern. After the delivery of the western posts by the English, the *County of Wayne* was set off by the territorial government, with the county seat of Detroit, extending north and west as far as the dominions of the United States; its *eastern* limit was defined to be the course of the Cuyahoga, the Muskingum, and the old portage path. From the time when *La Salle* made the voyage of the lakes in the "*Griffin*," until the abandonment of Canada by the French, in 1763, their traders traversed these regions, and are supposed to have established houses a few miles up the river. After them, the *British Fur Companies* occupied their place, and kept a few small vessels upon the lake. Some years before the settlement here, a schooner, commanded by Captain Thorn, was wrecked a short distance below town, and the crew wintered on shore near the remains of the vessel.

From an early day, the leading Virginia statesmen regarded the mouth of the Cuyahoga as an important commercial position. Geo. Washington, in his journey to the French forts, Venango and Le Boeuf, in 1753, obtained information which led him to consider it as the point of divergence of the future commerce of the lakes, meeting the ocean. Virginia being then regarded as the State through which this trade must pass to the Atlantic, Mr. Jefferson, in his notes upon that state, points out the channel through which it will move to the ocean. He considers the Cuyahoga and Mahoning as navigable, and separated only by a short portage, to be overcome by a canal. Once in the Ohio, produce, in his opinion, might ascend its branches and descend the Potomac to the sea.

In 1795, the Connecticut Land Company was organized at Hartford, Connecticut. On the 5th of September, the fifty-six individuals composing it received a deed from the State of Connecticut of three millions of acres, in what was called the Western Reserve. They sent out forty-three surveyors the next year, who were directed to divide that part lying east of the Cuyahoga into townships of five miles square. On the 16th of September, Seth Pease, (a brother of the late Judge Pease of the Supreme Court.) and Augustus Porter, commenced the survey of the "city of Cleveland," as it is called in the minutes. General Moses Cleveland, the agent of the company had the honor of furnishing it with a name.

This ground had been the source of much controversy between the states, and also the government. Connecticut laid claim to all north

of the forty-first degree of north latitude, as far as forty-two degrees two minutes north, and westward to the great South sea, by virtue of a patent from Charles II., king of England. New York procured a patent conflicting with this claim. Pennsylvania and Virginia had also their paper titles upon parts of the same territory. By deed, dated September 13, 1786, Connecticut released all claim to the western lands, excepting and *reserving* New Connecticut, since called "the Reserve." This embraces that part of Ohio north of the forty-first degree, and east of the meridian, one hundred and twenty miles west of the Pennsylvania line. By the deed of cession, Virginia had transferred most of her rights northwest of the Ohio to the United States, March 1st, 1784. Notwithstanding the claims of Connecticut to the Reserve, the United States assumed jurisdiction so far as political sovereignty was concerned, by the ordinance of July 13th, 1787. In 1792, Connecticut made a grant of *half a million* of acres, on the west end of the Reserve, to the sufferers by fire, and therefore called the "fire lands." She still claimed, but did not exercise jurisdiction of her western province. At length, on the 30th of May, 1800, the United States having relinquished all claim to the soil of this tract, the State of Connecticut gave up the rights of government to the Union at large.

The members of the Land Company, on the same day they received the deed from the State of that part east of the fire lands, conveyed to John Morgan, John Caldwell, and Jonathan Brace, all their lands *in trust*, for specified purposes; and it is through the *quit claim deeds* of these trustees that title to lands in this city and throughout the company's purchase is derived. The company paid the state one million two hundred thousand dollars for three million acres; each owner being a tenant in proportion to his stock.

By the close of 1797, the portion east of the Cuyahoga had been laid off into townships. Six of them, including Cleveland, were reserved for private sale, on account of some highly valuable advantages. Four were surveyed into lots of one hundred and sixty acres each, making four hundred in all, to be annexed to the poorer townships, in order to equalize them with *Poland*, the richest of all. The remaining ninety-three were drawn in a lottery. a township for every twelve thousand nine hundred and three dollars twenty-three cents interest, and conveyed by the trustees. The first drawing took place in February, 1798. In 1836, all the trustees first appointed were living, retained their trust, and executed deeds; Mr. Morgan

still survives. With the surveyors came Mr. Job Stiles and his family, and became the first resident. Judge Kingsbury, now of Newburg in this county, came about the same time, but left his family at Conneaut. Mrs. Stiles was the mother of the first, and Mrs. Kingsbury of the second white child born on the Reserve. Mr. Stiles left the county in '98, and Mr. Kingsbury removed to his present farm in the same year. In 1797, Lorenzo Carter became a permanent inhabitant, and soon after him, Nathaniel Doane, who went to Doane's Corners in 1798. Between this time and 1802, Mr. Hally, Mr. Gunn, Stephen Gilbert, Amos Spafford, David Clark, and Samuel Huntingdon, arrived and settled in Cleveland and its vicinity. Mr. Huntingdon afterward removed to Newburg Mills, and thence, in 1807, to Painesville. He was a judge of the Supreme court of Ohio, and governor of the State. Mr. Carter's first cabin stood under the hill between River street and Mandrake Lane, near St. Clair Lane. Mr. Clark died in 1806, on the farm across Kingsbury run, on the Pittsburg road.

In August, 1805, the Cuyahoga was made a port of entry, and John Walworth appointed collector. His first official duty, was the furnishing a clearance to the schooner "Good Intent," which was lost immediately after, near Long Point, crew, vessel, and cargo. He was also made postmaster, clerk of the court, and recorder; and died in September, 1812.

In July, 1797, the county of Washington was divided, and this place fell within the county of Jefferson, seat of justice at Steubenville. July 10, 1800, the county of Trumbull was established, county seat at Warren; and embracing all of the Reserve. December 31, 1805, a new division took place, which left Cleveland in the county of Geauga; organized March 1st, 1806. On the 10th of February, 1808, the county of Cuyahoga was erected; organized May 1st, 1810, with Cleveland as the county seat. The first court of Common Pleas was holden June 5, 1810. Of this court, Benjamin Ruggles was presiding judge, Major Nathan Perry, Timothy Doane and Augustus Gilbert, associates. Of the first grand jury, James Kingsbury was foreman; a place to which, by long usage, he seems to have acquired a kind of prescriptive right. The Supreme court held its first sitting on the 13th of August, 1810; judges, William W. Price, and Ethan Allen Brown. At the April term, 1812, an Indian of the Chippewa tribe, by the name of John-O-Mic, was indicted for the murder of

Daniel Buel, a white man, at Pipe creek, near Sandusky city. And also, as an accomplice with *Lemo*, an Indian of the same tribe, in the murder of Michael Gibbs, at the same place.

[The following account, taken from the "Sketches of the Reserve," prepared by John Barr, Esq., of Cleveland, and published in the National Magazine, descends somewhat more to the particular items, of our early history, and will form an interesting supplement to the account already given.]

"The region of country known as the Connecticut Reserve, and sub-named Fire Lands and Sufferers' Lands, extends one hundred and twenty miles from east to west, and, upon an average, fifty-two miles from north to south. The area is just 3,000,000 of acres. The subdivision, or Fire Lands, (five hundred thousand acres in all and located in the western portion of these reserve lands,) was a donation from the State of Connecticut to those of her citizens whose property had been destroyed by the incursions of the British against the towns of New London, Groton, Fairfield, and others, during the struggles of the Revolution. The 3,000,000 acres were offered for sale by the State of Connecticut, at Hartford, in 1795. Three distinct companies appeared as purchasers: but a compromise was effected between the agents of each, (Oliver Phelps, of Suffield, Conn., John Livingston, of Columbia county, New York, and William Hull, well known as afterwards Governor of Michigan,) by which the difficulties existing were removed; and two of the companies became the owners, with an understanding that the third (Hull's,) should share in the advantages to be derived.

Early in the spring of 1796, the directors of the Connecticut Land Company resolved upon the survey of their purchase. These directors were Oliver Phelps, as aforesaid; Henry Champion, of Colchester; Samuel Mather, of Lyme; Gen. Newbury, of New Windsor, and Gideon Granger—all of Connecticut. They proceeded to select forty surveyors, under the immediate direction and inspection of SETH PEASE and AUGUSTUS PORTER—the former subsequently Assistant Postmaster General, and now deceased—the latter alive, and residing at, or near Niagara Falls. The agent of the Company accompanying the survey was MOSES CLEVELAND, from whom the queen city of Lake Erie derives its name. Among the surveyors were J. Milton Holley, of Salisbury, Connecticut, a brother of Myron Holley, since one of the Canal Commissioners of New York; Moses Warren Amos Spafford, and Richard M. Stoddard. The surveying party pro-

ceeded to Schenectady in the month of June, 1796, where they remained until they collected the necessary compasses, chains, and other mathematical instruments for the traverse, and such stores as would be required for their journey and subsistence when arrived at and upon the theatre of their labors, and some two thousand dollars worth of dry goods, designed as presents to the Indians. For the transportation of these, the party procured four Schenectady batteaux, and in these ascended the Mohawk river, passing over the portage at Little Falls to Fort Stanwix, (now Rome,) where there was another portage from the Mohawk to Wood Creek, which empties into Oneida Lake. They followed this stream to the lake, crossed the latter, and through its outlet and the Oswego river, and along the south shore of Lake Ontario to the mouth of the river Niagara; up that stream to Queenston, on the British side; crossed the seven miles portage, arriving at Chippewa; from thence following the Niagara to Buffalo, where they were to meet Gen. Cleaveland and Mr. Porter. The journey that to our *modern* *modus operandi* is a self-sought pleasure excursion, was then a work of time, labor, and danger, and the expedition found it one of danger and death.

At Buffalo, (Messrs. Cleaveland, Porter and Holley, having joined the main body—the latter gentleman bringing some twelve or fourteen pack horses, and ten or twelve head of cattle,) a “talk” was had with the Seneca and Mohawk tribes as to the relinquishment of their real or imaginary claims to the possessions of the lands within the company’s purchase. Red Jacket, Farmer’s Brother, and other chiefs of the Senecas were present, as well as Col. Brant, (Thayandencagua,) sachem of the Mohawks. The Senecas urged their claim pertinaciously for three or four days, but finally withdrew them on the delivery to them, by General Cleaveland, of about twelve hundred dollars worth of goods.

The expedition then started—the boats skirting the lake coast, while a large majority of men progressed by land, driving before them the horses and cattle—and on the second day after quitting Buffalo arrived at Presque Isle, (now Erie,) where the boats lay wind-bound for several days. Again *en route*, the boats were sent up the bay to the narrowest part of the isthmus, unladen, and they and their cargoes transported by land across, and into the lake. Thence proceeding, the whole party arrived at (now) Conneaut, on the 4th of July, 1796.

The sons of revolutionary sires, some of them sharers of themselves in the great baptism of the republic, they made the anniversary of their country's freedom a day of ceremonial and rejoicing. They felt that they had arrived at the place of their labors, the—to many of them—sites of homes, as little alluring, almost as crowded with dangers, as were the levels of Jamestown or the rocks of Plymouth to the ancestors who had preceded them in the conquest of the seacoast wilderness of this continent. From old homes and friendly and social associations, they were almost as completely exiled as were the cavaliers who debarked upon the shores of Virginia, or the Puritans who sought the strand of Massachusetts. Far away as they were from the villages of their birth and boyhood; before them the trackless forest, or the untraversed lake, yet they did resolve to cast fatigue and privation and peril from their thoughts for the time being, and give to the day its due, to patriotism its awards. Mustering their numbers, they sat them down on the eastward shore of the stream now known as Conneaut, and dipping from the lake the liquor in which they pledged their country—their goblets some *tin cups* of no rare workmanship, yet every way answerable, with the ordnance accompaniment of two or three fowling pieces discharging the required national salute—the first settlers of the Reserve spent their landing-day as became the sons of Pilgrim Fathers—as the advance pioneers of a population that has since made the then wilderness of northern Ohio to “blossom as the rose,” and prove the homes of a people as remarkable for integrity, industry, love of country, moral truth and enlightened legislation as any to be found within the territorial limits of their ancestral New England.

The whole party numbered on this occasion fifty-two persons, of whom two were females, (Mrs. Stiles, and Mrs. Gunn, and a child.) As these individuals were the advance of after millions of population, their names become worthy of record, and are therefore given, viz: Moses Cleaveland, Augustus Porter, Seth Pease, Moses Warren, Amos Spafford, Milton Hawley, Richard M. Stoddard, Joshua Stow, Theodore Shepard, Joseph Tinker, Joseph McIntyre, George Proudfoot, Francis Gay, Samuel Forbes, Elijah Gunn, wife and child, Amos Sawten, Stephen Benton, Amos Barber, Samuel Hungerford, William E. Hall, Samuel Davenport, Asa Mason, Amzi Atwater, Michael Coffin, Elisha Ayres, Thomas Harris, Norman Wilcox, Timothy Dunham, George Goodwin, Shadrack Benham, Samuel Agnew, Warham Shepard, David Beard, John Briant, Titus V. Munson, Joseph Landon,

Job P. Stiles and wife, Charles Parker, Ezekiel Morley, Nathaniel Doan, Luke Hanchet, James Hasket, James Hamilton, Onley F. Rice, John Lock, and four others whose names are not mentioned.

On the 5th of July, the workmen of the expedition were employed in the erection of a large, awkwardly constructed log building; locating it on the sandy beach on the east shore of the stream, and naming it "Stow Castle," after one of the party. This became the store-house of the provisions, &c., and the dwelling-place of the families.

\* \* \* \* \*

After the completion of the stores-depot, and a day or two devoted to preparations for departure, the surveyors started. One division commenced at the junction of the Pennsylvania boundary with the lake coast, and measured south to the highlands north of the Mahoning river; while another, under the direction of General Cleveland, coasted along the shore of the lake to the Cuyahoga river.

\* \* \* \* \*

Gen. Cleveland, on arriving at the mouth of the Cuyahoga, entered the river, and followed its windings to where Tinker's Creek empties into the former, eleven miles south of Cleveland. The creek was so named, *Tinker* the navigator of the party being the discoverer of its point of debouchure. The General then returned to Conneaut, and while waiting for the return of the other exploring parties, held a council with a small tribe of Indians several miles above the latter outlet of the stream, and having made to them, through their chief, Pagua, some small presents, he effectively gained from them their friendship and respect for himself and his colleagues and his followers.

\* \* \* \* \*

The parties running the four first meridians having returned to Conneaut, General Cleveland, Mr. Porter, Joshua Stow, Dr. Shepard, and four others, started again, to make a southwise exploration of the lake boundary of the company's possessions. They took with them one of the batteaux for the transport of provisions, &c. Proceeding westward, they touched at the mouth of the Cuyahoga; thence to Sandusky bay, and returned to Cuyahoga river. Here they found Stiles with his wife, and some ten others of the party, and commenced the survey of the town-plot of what is now the city of Cleveland.—By the first of October, a log-cabin was erected. The city of Cleveland was outlined into two hundred and twenty lots of eight rods

front, and forty rods rear; the whole encircling a public square of nearly ten acres (inclusive of two highways passing there-through.) On the 18th of October, the surveyors quitted Cleveland, on their return route, leaving Stiles and his family, and Capt. Paine, since of Cleveland, to weather out the winter in the *solitudes* of the new city. At this time, it may be as well to state, the settlements of whites between the western shore of the Genesee river and the Western Ocean were as oases on Sahara. The garrison at fort Niagara; two families at Lewiston; one at Schlosser, and a British Indian interpreter; two Indian traders at Buffalo, and as near as we can gather, a family of New England origin; a few settlers at Presque Isle arrived there the previous year; Messrs. Kingsbury and Gunn with their wives at Conneaut; a French trader at Sandusky; the settlement at Detroit; and the far removed line of "Stockading" life on the north west bank of the Ohio river, made up the *civilization* of what was then almost unknown to geography; of that which was long politically considered as the "North West Territory"—and which is now the governmental element of one-third of the republic.

The winter of 1796-7 was one of privation to the few families remaining upon the Reserve, and the return of the surveyors on the ensuing spring was hailed as shipwrecked mariners greet the sail of the deliverer, or the famine-stricken welcome the dispenser of bread. Without flour, salt, and the common provisions for the support of life, the long months of frost and storm had worn on slowly and cheerless; and the departure of the vast fields of ice that stretched away from the shore of the lake, and the coming of the spring time, the latter conveying assurances of the arrival of friends and supplies, were regarded by the settlers at Cleveland and Conneaut as ransom evidences—the ransom from a state of existence that had so far yielded nothing but peril and privation.

The surveying party, on reaching the Reserve again, made Cleveland their head-quarters. The families at Conneaut were removed to the same point, and the business preliminaries towards permanent settlement were actively entered upon.

\* \* \* \* \*

In 1787, Congress passed the ordinance for governing the territory northwest of the Ohio; and Arthur St. Clair, the Governor thereof, established by proclamation. July 27th. 1788. the county of Washington, (seat of justice, Marietta.) The new county embraced nearly

all the territory now composing Ohio, east of the Sciota, and south and east of the British possessions, and, among the rest, that part of the Reserve east of the Cuyahoga river and Portage Path. In 1797, the county of Jefferson was established, with Steubenville for its capital, the Reserve being comprised therein. After the relinquishment of the frontier posts by Great Britain, that portion of the northwest territory which lay north of Wayne's treaty line, and west of Cuyahoga, was erected into a county called Wayne, (seat of justice, Detroit,) and embraced the northern part of the (now) States of Ohio and Indiana, Michigan, Illinois, and Wisconsin Territory. The section of the Reserve lying west of Cuyahoga and Portage Path was within the jurisdiction of the county of Wayne, and so remained until July 10, 1800, at which time Trumbull county was established. and embraced precisely the whole of the Connecticut Western Reserve. The town of Warren was made the county seat; county and quarter session courts were held in a space bounded by two *corn cribs*; and thither the citizens of the village of Cleveland resorted for legal remedies, &c. The conflicting claims of Connecticut and the United States were harmonized by acts of the two powers, passed in the year 1800; in which Connecticut released to the United States full political jurisdiction, while the Government confirmed to the State ample title to the soil of the Reserve.

The little colony at Cleveland increased slowly during the first years of settlement. Five families wintered here in the year 1797-8. In 1798, the surveyors made a line of road, under-brushed it, girdled the large timber, and bridged the small streams on the way from the Pennsylvania boundary to Cleveland. Before the close of the last century, colonies were in progress in Newburgh, Euclid, (Cuyahoga county;) Willoughby, Painesville, Mentor, (Lake county;) Burton, (Geauga county;) Harpersfield, Austinburg, Conneaut, Windsor, Morgan, (Ashtabula county;) Mesopotamia, Kinsman, Vernon, Hartford, Vienna, Coitsville, Poland, Boardman, Canfield, Liberty, Weathersfield, Warren, Youngstown, (Trumbull county;) Nelson, Mantua, Aurora, Ravenna, Rootstown, Atwater, Deerfield, (Portage county;) and Hudson, in the new county of Summit.

The disease seemingly consequent upon new settlements, sorely visited the pioneer population of the miniature city of Cleveland, Three of their number died of dysentery, in 1797; and the same dis-

case, together with the ague, prostrated nearly all of the surveyors, and on their departure in the fall of this year, they were, to use the language of one of their number, "a sickly, sorry set of beings."

Up to 1799, the citizens subsisted on such bread stuffs as their ingenuity devised; but during that year, a small grist mill was built at the falls of Mill Creek, some six miles southeast of the city; and during the ensuing winter, the colony enjoyed the luxury of bread, the grain of which was ground by themselves, and converted into flour at their own mill.

The varied fortunes, privations, and progress of the founders of the infant town, were such during the ensuing score of years, as may be rehearsed by the *Columbus* of every similar "location." There was a reckless philosophy tempering the tempers, and governing the growth of the solitude into a city. The arrival of a settler was hailed with far more protestation and real pleasure, than now marks the launching of a monster steamer, or the erection of a block of buildings. Like

"the hand  
Of brother in a foreign land,"

the earlier immigrant met the new comers upon the tide ensuing; and the fellowship of voluntary exile was as fervent, true and extensive, as though demanded by the pandects, or sanctioned by the decalogue. In coming from New England, they brought with them, into the forests of Ohio, New England feelings, affections and laws; so that, separated from the substance of these agents of social life they yet governed their actions by the spirit of the society from which they were sprung, and which they revered.

From 1800 to 1812, the populatative receipts were few and far between; the town waxed not into importance, although the country, stretching away from it, was rapidly filling up with a class of yeomanry of worth and industry; men who, in themselves and their descendants have filled the trust offices of the third State of the Union, and shown themselves every way qualified to discharge them well and wisely.

Cleveland, at the latter period stated, and even up to 1830, had not secured the favorable attention which it now so justly commands and receives. Even as late as 1825, it had a population of but five hundred souls; five years afterwards it had about doubled. In 1831,

it was 1,100; in 1832, the population was 1,500; in 1833, 1,900; in January, 1834, it was found to have swelled to 3,323; in November of the same year, it had increased to 4,250; in August, 1835, it was 5,080; in 1848, (including the township,) 7,137; and in January of the present year, 1845, connecting with it as we very justly may, OHIO CITY, the business of which is chiefly transacted in Cleveland, to which it is linked by two bridges spanning the Cuyahoga,) the whole number of souls was 12,035, (exclusive of the township, which may be safely estimated at two thousand additional.) Of the political progress of the place it is unnecessary to say much. It was incorporated into a village by an Act of the Legislature, passed December 23, 1814, and municipally governed by a board of Trustees, a President, and a Recorder. (Alfred Kelley, Esq., being its first President.) Previously, in 1805, the harbor was made a port of entry, and classed within the Erie District. In 1810, on the first of May of that year, Cleveland became the county seat of the county of Cuyahoga. On the 5th of June of the same year, the first court of Common Pleas was holden. In 1813, this point was made a depot of supplies and rendezvous for troops destined to cover places farther West. The court-house was erected in 1810. The first church was organized in 1816. The earliest appropriation by Government for the improvement of the harbor was made in 1825. In 1818 the first steamboat entered the mouth of the river. On the 4th of July, 1827, the first canal boat started from this termination of the gigantic improvement that links the Ohio and Mississippi rivers with the broad lakes of the northwest. On the third of March, 1836, the Legislature of Ohio elevated Cleveland into a city, under the charter now governing it; and in 1845, the citizens have voted to loan two hundred thousand dollars for the construction (so far as it goes) of a railroad to terminate at Cincinnati.

The completion of the Ohio Canal gave to Cleveland a prominence that at once attracted the favorable attention of eastern capitalists to this city, as a point of purchase for the great grain crop of Ohio, while southern and southwestern merchants, as well as the heavy merchandise dealers of the Atlantic cities, hailed it as the only available avenue of connection for transportation purposes between the produce regions, whence emanated the grain supply of millions of consumers, and the manufactures of Old and New England.—Stretching as it does through the fairest and most fertile portions of

the State, and the territory southwest, illimitable as to size almost, and rapidly peopling, the Grand Canal at once entered upon widespread favor, and Cleveland, immediately upon its completion, became *the City of the Lakes.*"

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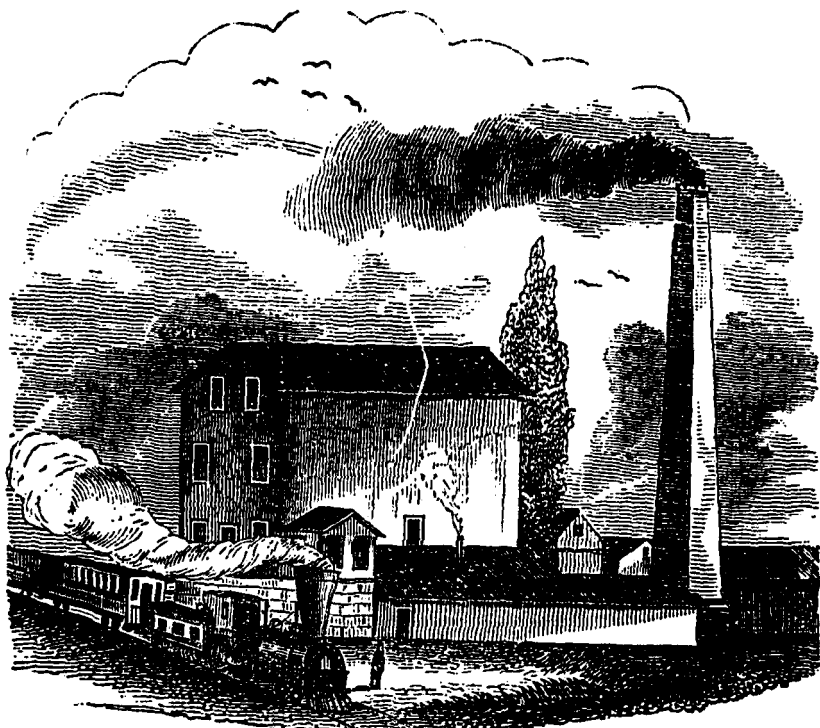

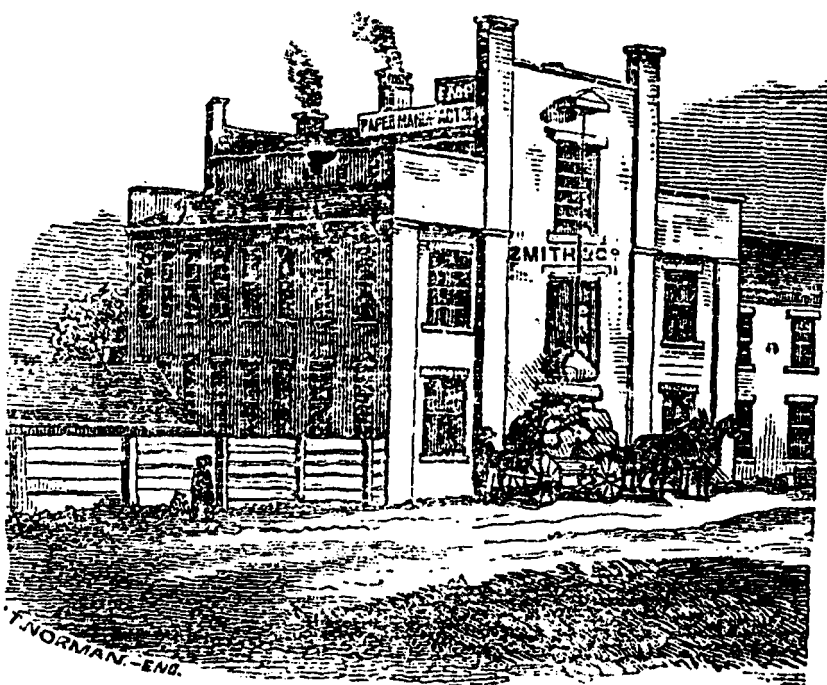

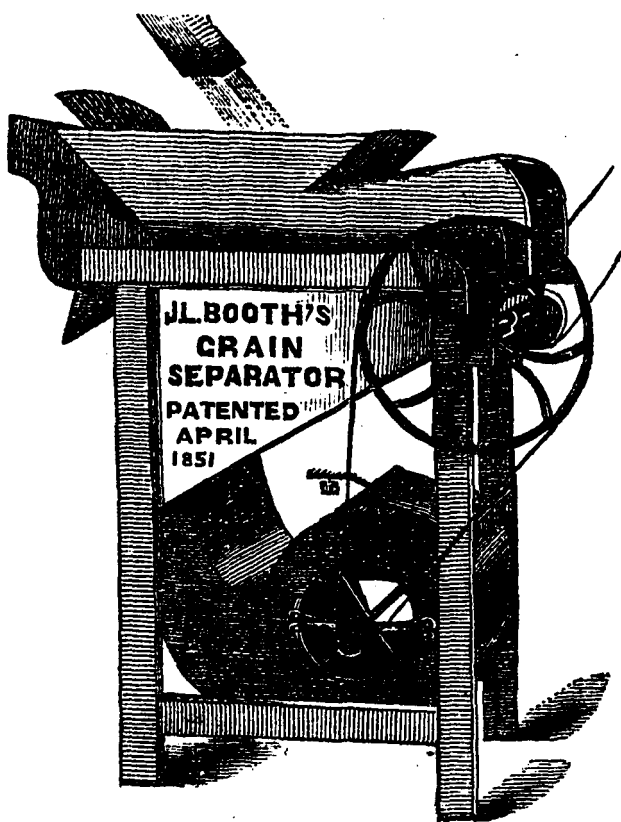
