DEDICATORY.

THE following fragments of history, gathered from the minutes of the Presbyteries of Donegal and of Carlisle; the records of the Board of Trustees of Hanover Church, some very incomplete records of the last pastor of the church, from tax lists, tradition, &c., are respectfully dedicated to the descendants of "Old Hanover," by one of their number who has felt a special interest in rescuing from oblivion whatever memorials he could obtain of a church whose

earthly history is ended, save as she lives in her widely scattered children. It has been deemed wisest in a few instances to preserve theancient spelling of proper means. The

original name of Old Hanover Church was Monnoday or Manada, the Indian name of a creek which, breaking through a gap in the Kittatinny mountains, becomes, after a few miles, a tributary of the Swatara. The old church stood about three miles from the mountains and eleven from Harrisburg. Visiting the place a few months ago; the writer found only scattered remnants of the ancient stone structure, and close by the walled grave-yard where the "Fathers of ye olden time" are sleeping. A fund for the repairing of the grave-yard, obtained by the sale of the church building and from other sources, is in the hands of a body of trustees. The building was in

dilapidated condition and had been wholly unfit for the use of worship for a score or more of years. It was, as the engraving of it shows, a plain, stone, barn-like structure, but well adapted, by the strength of its walls, for the worship of many generations. The home of the last pastor of the church stands but a few rods away, and by the very gate of the parsonage yard there breaks forth, full and strong, from the hill-side, one of the many springs of cool, clear, delightful water, with which this entire region abounds. thirsty worshippers of several generations refreshed themselves at the intervals of religious service. Two or three of the old families are still represented in the homes of the region, but the well-filled grave-vard, where many an unmarked mound, many a well-worn. moss-covered stone, with the better-preserved memorial of later times, may be seen, shows how large a Presbyterian ancestry once occupied this region. It would be pleasant to the compiler of these memorials, to receive from any of the descendants of Old Hanover to whom they may come, such further facts and traditions of the early times as they may possess. He would also take this occasion to return his thanks to his fellow-members of "The Historical Society" for very valuable aid in exhuming and preparing parts of this record; especially to those unwearied delvers after the history of the early times in central Pennsylvania, Messrs. A. B. Hamilton and W. H. Egle, M. D.

EARLY HISTORY OF "OLD HANOVER."

1725. In 1735 the Presbytery of Donegal, then the only Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in America west of Philadelphia. was in session at Nottingham, Chester county, Pa., in the month of September. This Presbytery had been created by order of the Synod of Philadelphia in September, 1732. The original members of it were Rev. Messrs. James Anderson, Adam Boyd, William Bertram, John Thomson and Robert Orr. On the 3d of September, 1735, a supplication was presented from "A people on the borders of Suitara Congregation, desiring the countenance of Presbytery in building a new meeting house in order to have supplies;" which being read, the Rev. William Bertram, the pastor of the Swatara Congregation, reported that his people desired him to signify to the Presbytery that they desire them to defer granting said supplication The matter was deferred until the next meetuntil they be heard. ing of Presbytery.

At a session of Presbytery held at the same place, October 7, 1735, the affair of the people of Manada Creek was again deferred.

"Mr. Richard Sankey, a theological student from Ireland, having produced his certificate at last meeting before the members of Presbytery, and been taken under its care, the Presbytery ordered that be endeavor to acquaint himself with the brethren before our next meeting; and also endeavor to prepare some preliminary extempore trials against our next meeting."

At a session of the Presbytery held at Middle Octorara, Lancaster county, November 20th, Lazarus Stewart appeared to prosecute a supplication of Manada Creek for a new erection.

Rev. Messrs. Craighead and Anderson, who had been appointed to consider the matter of dividing Rev. Mr. Bertram's congregation, reported that the Congregation of Derry desired to be separated from Paxton as a distinct congregation, and to have their bounds defined. The Presbytery desired to be better informed about the distances

and situation of the people before coming to a decision in these matters, and appointed Rev. James Anderson, and "any brother whom the standing committee of Presbytery may designate" to act with him, to "perambulate the bounds and borders of the congregation of Derry and the people of Manada some time next spring, said brethren to take particular notice of the meeting house of Manada, its distance from the meeting house of Derry." They are also empowered to fix the bounds of said people, and to determine concerning the meeting house of Manada.

Paxtang, Derry and Manada, afterwards known as Hanover, were at this time under the pastoral care of Rev. Mr. Bertram, making a very large and widely scattered congregation. The meeting houses were at Paxtang and Derry, but as new settlers came in, and new lands were taken up, the boundaries of the congregation enlarged, and new meeting houses were needed. The people of Manada were settled along Manada creek, towards the Kittatinny or Blue Hills eastward and northward. The district covered by Mr. Bertram's charge was from fifteen to twenty-five miles in length and breadth; reaching from the Conewago creek to the mountains, and embracing all the people east of the Susquehanna, beyond the western line of the Donegal congregation, Rev. Mr. Anderson's. It was by common consent a law of the times, that meeting houses should be about ten miles apart, so that the people might not be compelled to travel too far for Sabbath worship. The formation of new congregations was often a matter of difficulty and much dispute, as was also the location of new "meeting houses."

The region along Manada creek to the mountains was settled rapidly, and the people early began to feel the inconvenience of going so far as Derry to church, and moved for a new "creetion or congregation." At that early day they were all Irish or Scotch-Irish, and were connected with the Presbyterian church. The boundaries of congregations and the location of meeting houses were determined by the Presbytery with considerable authority.

At the meeting of Presbytery, November, 1735, Mr. Sankey, or Sanckey, or Zanchy, as the name is variously given, was questioned by Presbytery on Divinity and Philosophy, and having satisfied the body with his answers, he was directed to write a sermon on Prov. III, 6: "In all thy ways acknowledge Him," &c., to be read before the Standing Committee at their first meeting, who, if they see cause, shall appoint him another subject for discourse as a piece of trial at the next meeting of Presbytery. On December 10, 1735,

Mr. Sankey delivered his discourse on Prov. III, 6. It was approved and he was directed to prepare another for Presbytery on Psalm XLIII, 3: "O send out Thy light, &c."

1736. On May 25, 1736, the Presbytery met at Nottingham. Rev. James Anderson, Mr. Andrew Galbraith and Mr. William Maxwell, a ruling elder from Paxtang, were ordered to meet on Tuesday before the next meeting of Presbytery at Derry, to be held on the first Monday in September, in order to perambulate the "bounds" between the people of Derry and Manada.

On May 26th Mr. Sankey delivered a lecture on the XXIII Psalm, which was approved, and he was ordered to prepare an exegesis or critical exercise on "An Christus qua Mediator, sit orderanda."

Mr. Anderson reported that the perambulation between Derry and Manada had been fulfilled, and gave in the statements of the committee in writing. Debates and pleadings were had between the parties at length. Afterwards the Presbytery retired into "The little House." [This was a small building near the Derry church, which was used as a study for the pastor, and also as a room for the church session and other purposes.] After consideration and debate. the Presbytery resolved to erect the people of Manada into a distinct congregation, and approved the place where they had begun to build as most suitable for a meeting house. Mr. Lazarus Stewart engaged to the Presbytery that all persons who belong to or shall join themselves to the new erection, who are in arrears to Mr. Bertram shall pay up. On the next day it was agreed by the people of Manada and Derry, and ordered by the Presbytery, "that the people on the borders of these two congregations, that is, between the meeting houses and beyond the creek of Suitara, shall on or before the first of November next, declare in an orderly way, i. e. before some elder or principal man in the congregation, which they make choice of, whether they will join the congregation of Derry or Manada, and after said first day of November none who dwell in bounds shall be at liberty to alter their choice but by the concurrence of both the congregations or order of the Presbytery."

September 2, Mr. Sankey delivered his discourse on Rom. II, 3, and his essay on "An Christus," &c., both of which were approved, and he was ordered to prepare a sermon on Rom. III, 81, and also to be prepared to defend his thesis against next meeting.

October 26, Mr. Lazarus Stewart reported at a meeting of Presbytery in "Dunagal" that nothing had been done in paying arrears to

Rev. Mr. Bertram, because no list of arrears had been rendered, but that they were ready to act when an account is rendered.

October 27, Mr. Sankey gave a popular sermon, and was further examined in Languages and Philosophy, acknowledging the Westminster Confession and Catechisms, and promising to conform to the Directory, and to give subjection to the Presbytery, and was licensed to preach the Gospel as a probationer.

November 10, it was ordered that Messrs. James Gelston and Richard Sankey supply Pequea and Manada by monthly turns alternately until the next meeting of Presbytery.

1737. April 6, in pursuance of a supplication from the people of Manada, Mr. Bertram was ordered to supply that people on the last Sabbath of April, and to convene the people on some day of the following week, in order to moderate a call to Mr. Sankey.

June 22, a supplication and a call to Mr. Sankey was presented to Presbytery by John Cunningham and Robert Grier, commissioners from the congregation of Hanover, (Manada,) by which said-commissioners are empowered to promise towards Mr. Sankey's support among the people of Hanover as their orderly pastor, the annual payment of sixty pounds, i. e., one-half in cloth and the other in particular commodities, as flax, hemp, linen yarn and cloth, together with several gratuities mentioned in said supplication. Said call was recommended to Mr. Sankey's consideration till the next meeting of Presbytery. He was appointed to supply Paxtang and Hanover alternately, and to open the next meeting of Presbytery with a sermon from Rom. VI, 21.

PASTORATE OF REV. RICHARD SANKEY.

August 31, Presbytery met at Middle Octorara. Mr. Sankey opened with a sermon from Rom. VI, 22, preaching from that verse by mistake. The discourse was approved as a part of trial, and he was ordered to prepare an exegetical discourse on the Resurrection of Christ as a "common head." He accepted the call from Hanover, and was appointed to supply the pulpit till the next meeting of Presbytery.

October 6, Mr. Sankey opened Presbytery with a sermon from Mark XVI, 9, which was accepted as a part of his trial. The people of Hanover asked that Mr. Sankey's ordination and installation be hastened. He was ordered to supply them until the next meeting of Presbytery.

Mr. Sankey at this time got himself into trouble. It came out that he had sent to a Mr. Hunter, of New Castle Presbytery, a sermon containing some very considerable errors in point of important doctrines of religion. Mr. Hunter used the sermon as one of his trial pieces before the Presbytery, and was in consequence set aside by Presbytery. It was then agreed by the Presbytery that Mr. Sankey should be appointed as correspondent to attend a meeting of the Presbytery of New Castle, and clear up the matter. went thither, and on inquiry it was found that he had sent notes of a sermon to Mr. Hunter, and that said notes did contain such errors as were reported, but that Mr. Sankey had not only condemned and laid aside such erroneous notes from all use, but had sent a letter of contrition with said notes to Mr. Hunter, which did not come The Presbytery, after much and serious considerainto his hands. tion, concluded that, although upon a serious review of Mr. Sankey's conduct both before and after his being preacher, we cannot see any ground to suspect him of unsoundness of the faith, yet we condemn as a great and gross imprudence his writing and sending forth such notes, and thereby giving such occasion for stumbling both to ministers and people, and therefore judge that he ought to be severely rebuked by the moderator for the same, and strictly cautioned to act with more circumspection for the future, and to guard against all offensive conduct either in this or any other kind. Mr. Sankey, being called in, was accordingly rebuked, which he cheerfully submitted to. He was ordered to deliver an exposition of Psalm XV, and to prepare a Presbyterial exercise from Rom. VIII, 4, at the next meeting. [P. S. The two passages seem to have been given as a reproof to Mr. Sankey's unrighteousness.]

1738. April 6, Mr. Sankey opened Presbytery at Donegal with an exposition of the XV Psalm. The Presbyterial exercise was deferred until the next meeting, and he was ordered to preach a popular sermon from John I, 29.

At the meeting in June, he delivered both the exercise and the sermon, and they were both approved. The next meeting of Presbytery was appointed at Hanover, on the last Wednesday of August, when Mr. Sankey was to have his extempore trial, and if approved, to be ordained and installed on the next day, the last Thursday of August, 1738. Rev. Wm. Bertram was appointed to preside.

August 30, the Presbytery of Donegal met for the first time at Hanover. Present: Ministers—Thomas Craighead, Alexander Craighead, William Bertram, James Anderson, Adam Boyd, John Paul,

Samuel Black, John Thomson. Ruling Elders—Matthew Atchison, Daniel Henderson, James Carothers, John Christy and Hugh Scott. Mr. Sankey gave his extempore trial, which was approved, and all other parts of trial, and it was ordered that he be ordained to-morrow. Richard Sankey was ordained and received as a member of the Presbytery of Donegal, and was installed as the first pastor of the Hanover church.

1745. The next reference to Hanover in the minutes of Presbytery is in June, when it met again at Hanover. The pastoral relation between Mr. Sankey and Hanover church is declared to be in a satisfactory condition. The people are, however, in arrears of salary. It was customary whenever the Presbytery met at a particular church to make a thorough examination into the condition of affairs. They first called the pastor before them in private and questioned him about the elders and the people; then they called the elders and questioned them about the pastor and people; lastly, the representatives of the people were called and questioned, in private also, about the pastor and elders.

1745 to 1750. *The Presbytery of Donegal and the churches were now passing through a stormy period—the period of the Old and New Light controversy, raised in connection with the revivals of Whitefield and the Tennents. The state of religion became shamefully low. The feuds were bitter. The ministry, by their conduct, brought reproach upon religion, and sometimes upon good morals even. The vice of intemperance seems to have prevailed, and even the clergy indulged to excess. There was also a looseness of morals made painfully evident in the reports before Presbytery. The records give, however, little history of the churches. The Presbytery became divided, the original Presbytery of Donegal adhering to the Old Light party. The minutes are very brief and were very negligently kept for years. But little business was done. They close very abruptly in 1750. Mr. Sankey was still the pastor of Hanover, but we have no history of his work there or of the state of the church.

Nine years of the records of Donegal Presbytery now disappear, and with these all history of the Hanover church. Mr. Sankey continued in the pastoral care of the church.

1759. In 1759, June 5, the records of the Presbytery of Donegal are resumed. Mr. Sankey is still a member of Presbytery and resid-

ing at Hanover. At this period, from 1756* to 1764, the entire region was greatly harrassed by Indian wars. The savages, spurred on by

were often driven from their homes. Forts and stockades were built for defence, but murders and massacres frequently occurred. So greatly were the people harrassed that many left their farms and homes for safer regions. On June 6, 1759, we learn that Mr. Sankey, having received a call to a congregation in Virginia, and designing to remove there, applied for and received credentials from the Presbytery. His relation to the Hanover church as pastor seems to have been already dissolved. He removed to Virginia, accompanied by many of the Hanover congregation, about 1760. The main reason for going was to escape the incursions of the savages. He settled at Buffalo, joined the Hanover Presbytery of Virginia in 1760, and was appointed to preside at the opening of the Synod of Virginia in 1785. He lived to a good old age, respected by his people and his brethrer in the ministry.

Mr. Sankey served Hanover church for twenty-one years, and though no further record is known of his ministry, it was evidently an acceptable one to the people, who kept him so long, and many of whom accompanied him when he left. This closed the first pastorate of Hanover church. After his dismissal during the year 1759 the church was supplied occasionally by Rev. Messrs. John Steel and John Elder.

- 1760. At a meeting of the Presbytery in 1760 Hanover asked for supplies, and also sought from the Synod candidates for their pulpit, with a view to settlement. In the year 1760 Rev. Messrs. Elder, Duffield, Roan and Williams occasionally preached for them. The church asked Presbytery to secure for them from the Presbytery of New Brunswick a further hearing of a Mr. Carmichael, and that if possible he be induced to join the Presbytery of Donegal. The services of Mr. Latta, of Philadelphia Presbytery, were also sought. These two men, with Mr. Williamson, seem to have preached for the church as candidates, but were not chosen to the pastorate.
- 1761. During the year 1761 Hanover was supplied mainly by Rev. Messrs. Roan, Tate, Elder, Beard and M'Mordie.

PASTORATE OF THE REV. ROBERT M'MORDIE.

1762. In 1762, in November, a call was made for the Rev. Robert M'Mordie, which he accepted. The congregation promised him eighty pounds for his temporal support, to be secured by bonds. Rev. Messrs. John Elder and Joseph Tate were appointed to install him on the fourth Sunday of November, 1762, Mr. Elder to preside.

No record of the installation is made, but it was doubtless carried out at the fixed time.

The congregation had been diminished somewhat by the removals to Virginia. The Old and New Light controversies still troubled the churches and caused dissensions and divisions in the congregations. In April a number of persons, names not given, supplicate the Presbytery for a dismissal from Hanover church, with liberty to join some neighboring congregation. The matter was discussed and deferred from year to year. In June of the same year Rev. Messrs. Robert M'Mordie, John Elder, John Steel, John Beard, Joseph Tate and Sampson Smith declined to sit in Presbytery because of contention and party spirit. They all belonged to the Old Light side of the controversy.

- 1764. It is evident that a part of the congregation of Hanover were on the New Light side of the conflict, for in October, 1764, several members of the congregation represent to Presbytery that they never consented to take Mr. M'Mordie for pastor; that said call was made out irregularly, and they now request that they may be allowed to join some other congregation, probably that of the Rev. John Roan, who was a New Light man. The matter was deferred.
- 1765. It came up again in February, 1765, when Mr. M'Mordie objected to the Presbytery taking any action in the case. The petitioners were, however, granted leave to go elsewhere and have their children baptized, though they were not to dissolve their connection with Hanover church. This did not end matters, and in April the Presbytery met at Hanover to consider the troubles in that church. Nothing was accomplished, and they met again in May.

In the same month of May the Synod dissolved the Presbytery, and the Presbytery of Carlisle was formed, consisting of the ministers and churches west of the Susquehanna. It lived, however, but a year and died, and the Presbytery of Donegal was restored to its original bounds, and met June 24 at Carlisle. The churches and ministers of Donegal Presbytery east of the Susquehanna were organized into the new Presbytery of Lancaster. Mr. M'Mordie, with Hanover church, belonged to this Presbytery. It, too, survived but a year. During this year, 1765–1766, the church of Hanover became vacant. No record of Mr. M'Mordie's resignation exists, but it was doubtless caused by the dissensions in his church. After his withdrawal the church continued in a distracted and enfeebled state.

For many years it depended entirely upon occasional supplies, having no settled pastor, and, so far as we can learn, seeking none.*

1772. †April 16 Rev. John Roan was directed to supply at Hanover, and to moderate a call for Mr. William Thom, and Mr. Thom

1771. † Twice was the congregation at Hanover greatly depleted. First by the exodus into Virginia of forty or fifty families, who settled in Hanover county, where their beloved pastor, Rev. Mr. Sankey, had located. Earnest efforts have been made to gather the names of these Hanoverians, but as yet fruitless. Second, by the adherents of Lazarus Stewart, who accompanied him to Wyoming. The names of nearly all of these have been secured, and are as follows:

is appointed one of the supplies at Hanover. On the 21st of May a call for Mr. Thom was presented in Presbytery, with a copy of a subscription paper of over one hundred pounds. The call was put into his hands. In the meantime Mr. Thom received other calls from Big Spring, Sherman's Valley and Alexandria, Va., and on October 15, 1772, accepted the latter. For the next seven years, covering part of the period of the Revolutionary war, the Hanover church depended on occasional supplies. The times tried men's souls. Men were called away to war. The people were poor.

1779. October 19, 1779, a call from Hanover for Mr. Joseph Henderson was presented at Presbytery and put into his hands. They agreed to pay him yearly, if he accepted, the full quantity of five hundred bushels of wheat. The call was declined, and supplies continued for two years longer, when, on the 20th of June, 1781, a call from Hanover to Rev. Matthew Woods was made out, in which they promise to pay him six hundred bushels of wheat, or a sum of hard money equivalent thereto, and also a gratuity of six hundred bushels. The cause of these peculiar calls in grain was the greatly depreciated value of the Continental currency. Mr. Woods accepted the call, and was ordained and installed over the Hanover congregation June 19, 1782.

PASTORATE OF REV. MATTHEW WOODS.

1782-84. The pastorate of Mr. Woods was a brief one, and there remains no record of it beyond the fact that August, 19, 1784, he reported in the Presbytery that some disturbance had arisen in his congregation, occasioned by a Rev. Mr. Hindman, who was formerly on trial before Presbytery for some irregularities. He asked the interposition of Presbytery, and a committee was appointed to attend to the matter, but in less than a month, on September 13, 1784, the Rev. Matthew Woods died. A tombstone was erected to his memory in 1789 by the following subscribers:

The body of Mr. Woods was buried in the Hanover grave-yard, adjoining the church.

- 1786. There was now a vacancy in the pastorate, during which supplies were furnished by Presbytery. After two years a call was extended to Mr. Samuel Wilson, a young licentiate, and a salary of £150 was promised him, but it was declined.
- 1787. Hanover was allowed to prosecute a call to a probationer for the ministry under the care of the Presbytery of Philadelphia. On the 16th of October Mr. James Snodgrass was received under the care of the Presbytery from the Philadelphia Presbytery, and having accepted a call from the Hanover congregation, he was appointed to prepare a lecture on Rom. VIII, 1-7, and a Presbyterial exercise on I Cor. XV, 22, as parts of his trial for ordination.
- 1788. On the 13th of May the Presbytery of Carlisle met at Hanover. Present—Rev. Messrs. John Elder, John Hoge, John Linn, John Craighead, Robert Cooper and Samuel Waugh, with James Johnston, elder. Upon the next day, May 14, 1788, James Snodgrass was ordained and installed as pastor of the Hanover congregation. Rev. John Craighead presided and gave the charge, and the Rev. John Linn preached the sermon from II Cor. IV, 5.

PASTORATE OF REV. JAMES SNODGRASS.

A copy of the call of Hanover church to Mr. Snodgrass:

SIR:—We the members of the Presbyterian congregation of Hanover, in the county of Dauphin, being for some time past destitute of a stated Gospel minister, and being sensible of the great loss that we and our tender offspring do sustain by our living in such a destitute condition in this wilderness, and being satisfied of the ministerial abilities of you, the Rev. James Snodgrand of unanimously invite and call upon you to take the pastoral cannot doversight of us, promising all due subjection, submission and obedience to the doctrine, discipline, government and ordinances exercised and administered by you as our pastor in the Lord. And that you may

be better able to attend upon your pastoral and ministerial work, without anxious and distracting cares about your worldly concerns, we do hereby cheerfully promise and engage to provide for your support in a decent and comfortable manner, suitable and becoming your respectable office and station as a minister of the Gospel and Ambassador of the Prince of Peace, knowing that the Lord hath ordained that they who preach the Gospel shall live by the Gospel.

In testimony whereof, we hereby subscribe our names this tenth day of May, 1787.

Contrary to modern custom the amount of the salary is not mentioned in the call, but from the book of the trustees, which is in existence, we learn that the amount of the salary was probably one hundred and fifty pounds. In subsequent years Mr. Snodgrass lived upon a farm near the church, of which he was the owner. The church, probably, owned no ground beyond a few acres surrounding the church, part of which was used as a burial ground. Mr. Snodgrass was the last pastor of Hanover, but he served the church through a very long pastorate, down to the day of his death, on the second day of July, 1846, a period of over fifty-eight years from the date of his installation, May 14, 1788. To this should be added the six months or more in which he sup-

plied the pulpit prior to his ordination. The congregation of Hanover was wholly a country one, made up of a farming people and the few mechanics always to be found in a farming region, country increased in population the original Scotch-Irish settlers slowly disappeared, selling their farms to Germans and going themselves, mainly westward. Mr. Snodgrass, like most of the early ministers, failed to keep a record of his times. There does not exist, so far as can be learned, the slightest record of any churchsession, or of any election of ruling elders by the church. Tradition gives us the names of some who served in the eldership of the church, but there is no existing record of any meeting of the session. No sessional book appears to have been kept. During the first eight or ten years of his pastorate Mr. Snodgrass kept in a blank book of the trustees of the church, a record of the marriages. baptisms and admissions to the church, but he seems to have become weary of it and to have utterly abandoned it before the year 1800. There is no record of removals from the church by letter or by A list remains of the heads of families about the year 1788. and the lists of those who paid stipends are continued down to the date of his death. Mr. Snodgrass' receipts for his salary, and the records of the board of trustees are also in existence. Some of these are here given, that they may be preserved for future reference.

The following description of Mr. Snodgrass is given by his son, the Rev. Dr. W. D. Snodgrass, of Goshen, N. Y.:

In person my father was about 5 feet 11 inches in height. His

frame was erect, strong and in every respect well developed. hair was dark and changed to an iron-gray, though it never became white, even in his last years. He was of a pleasant countenance and amiable disposition, remarkably free from anything calculated to incur the dislike or displeasure of those with whom he had intercourse, fond of society, animated in conversation, and in every way agreeable to all around him. His bodily health during the greater part of his life was almost uninterrupted. He was temperate, simple and regular in his mode of living, and for years in succession was not absent from his pulpit a single day on account of sickness. As a preacher he had by nature the advantage of a good voice. spoke distinctly, was animated and earnest, and drew the matter of his discourses directly from the Bible. During a considerable portion of ministry his Sabbath morning exercise was in the form of an exposition or lecture. He selected a book generally from the New Testament, and commented upon it from beginning to end, selecting larger or smaller passages as his judgment dictated, and closing with extended practical remarks. He was clear, logical and forcible in his statements of truth, and was regarded by his ministerial brethren, who knew him best, as an able, impressive and profitable preacher."

Rev. Wm. Simonton, his grandson, who knew him only in his later years, gives the following as his impression of him thirty-one years after death: "I only remember him as an old man, with silvery hair, and stooped with age. He was of medium height and of a little more than medium weight. His complexion was light, his features regular, except the end of the nose, which was somewhat prominent and inclined upward; with a mild and pleasant expression of countenance. The color of his eyes I cannot with certainty recall, but I think they were gray."

"He always preached memoriter. His sermons were written very compactly, in a kind of short-hand, in which the vowels were omitted. When committing them he paced the room. They were methodical, clear, scriptural, spiritual and evangelical. Father once remarked that he had 'never heard grandfather use an ungrammatical expression in the pulpit.' He was discriminating and accurate in his statements, and in the delivery of his discourses he never hesitated or recalled a word. His voice and enunciation were good, though he used but a few notes of the scale. There was not, therefore, as much variety in his tones as is desirable in a public speaker.

His manner was solemn and impressive. His gestures, as I remember them, were confined for the most part to the hands, which peered out of very long coat-sleeves. The gestures were made with the fore-arm resting upon the Bible or pulpit. His 'principal prayer' was long, systematic and comprehensive. It embraced the parts of prayer given in the Directory for Worship, Chap. V, and generally in the order there observed. He believed in the Divine control of nature's operations, and in times of drought he prayed for 'seasonable and refreshing showers.' Nor did he omit to give thanks for the same when the hopes of the husbandman were filled."

"I remember hearing him say that punctuality ought to have a place among the cardinal virtues. He exemplified these virtues by beginning the services from ten to five minutes before the appointed time. This was his habit. He took a deep interest in public affairs, and entered heartily into conversation upon the topics of the day, but habitually interjected serious reflections and suggested a spiritual improvement of the subject without interrupting the flow of thought or turning it into a channel distinctly religious. He had a very happy faculty of this kind. He used it with effect in impressing the minds of the young and without giving offence to any class of the thoughtless and indifferent. In this respect his conduct came nearer to that of the ideal minister than that of any I have ever known."

Mr. Snodgrass lived in Hanover until his death, which occurred July 2, 1846. He was a man of energy and decision. German settlers gradually bought up the farms. It was related to the writer by the Rev. Dr. Wm. R. DeWitt, that at one time during Mr. Snodgrass' ministry he was elected township constable. Some of the new-coming settlers were altering their road-lines, contracting the highway. Probably Mr. Snodgrass objected. In contempt and ridicule, not believing he would serve, the people chose him constable. They were mistaken. He at once qualified, appointed a dep-

uty, who went through the township and compelled every offender to re-set his fences upon the right lines.

The church was very weak at the time of his death and never had another pastor. The building fell into decay, and was at length, in 1875 or '76, taken down. The care of the Glebe funds and the cemetery grounds was placed in the hands of trustees. But three church members remain in 1877. They will probably be transferred to Paxtang church, and the Hanover church be stricken from the roll of Presbytery.

CONEWAGO CHURCH.

THIS narrative has no claim to originality, or to be of any special interest; yet the facts presented are too precious to be lost, and however void of general interest they may be found, are worth preserving in this permanent form. In a very few years all trace of the godly men who formed this congregation would have been lost, and the episode here preserved, is therefore worth examination, imperfectly as it is presented.

As early as July, 1718, there was a considerable population above the mouth of Conoy creek, in Chester, now Lancaster, county, on the east bank of the Susquehanna river. From 1720 to 1725 many of the restless spirits of it migrated further westward, mostly into the broad and well-watered valley of the Conewago creek, now the division line between the counties of Lancaster and Dauphin. These emigrants settled mainly along a road which in after days came to be the Harrisburg, Elizabethtown and Lancaster turnpike. location nearly midway between Elizabethtown and Middletown. These settlers were emigrants from the Province of Ulster, Ireland. They were all of the Presbyterian faith, and having, as is supposed, erected a place of worship, began early in 1735 to agitate the question of a settled pastor. From that time, as we know, they were furnished with supplies by the Presbyteries of Newcastle and Donegal. In 1741 they subscribed a sufficient sum and were furnished with a permanent pastor.

As long ago as 1796 all trace of the position of the church building was obliterated from the face of the earth. No tradition or relic remains of it, notwithstanding very diligent inquiry has been made for information respecting its location. A ruinous burial place is all that is left of what was once an active congregation of Presbyterians, "amid a land of gushing springs."

Thus it has happened, that at the period when the researches relative to this extinct congregation were made, not a dozen persons

in the county of Dauphin, except a very few in immediate vicinity to a couple of deserted burial places, knew enough about it to "point the spot where active men and women rested from all earthly toil an hundred years ago."

In 1877, as will be observed by the papers which are embodied, Rev. William A. West, pastor of the Westminster Presbyterian congregation at Harrisburg, received a letter from a clerical friend in North Carolina. To enable him to frame a reply to his correspondent, many inquiries were instituted, generally without success. It is the purpose of this sketch to present a brief narrative of the steps taken to obtain information respecting an historical fact, of which we were so ignorant.

The Rev. Dr. E. F. Rockwell writes:

COOL SPRINGS, IREDELL Co., N. C., January 24, 1877.

James Hall and wife, Prudence (Roddy) Hall, the parents of Rev. James Hall, D. D., who went to General Assembly sixteen times, and was wedded 1803, came here and settled on Fifth creek, near Bethany church, 1751-2. They had a certificate: "That James Hall and his wife Prudence (Roddy) Hall heath lived in this congrigation ever since it was erected, & heave behaved themselves cristianly & soberly without aney public scandal known to us, & heave been partakers of scaling ordinances amonghst us, & may be recived into aney cristian society wherever God in his Providence shall order their lott, is certified this 20t day of august 1751 by the session att Conawago.

HUGH HALL,

We are desirous to know where and whether there is any record like this—any names yet remaining there like these? The first four are names of the Scotch-Irish settlers here from Pennsylvania about that time. These parties had a son Hugh Hall. We have found twenty-four or twenty-five ministers of the Gospel among the descendants of James and P. Hall, and about twenty-eight females have married preachers. Rev. Robert Hall, who died last November at Oxford, Ohio, was a grandson. They have spread out all over the country. I preach one-half of the time at Bethany church, which is the name of a post office near by, you may see on Colton's map (atlas.) We had our Centennial celebration August, 1875, and had a large assembly.

Last October I was in Philadelphia. I saw Rev. J. G. Craighead, D. D. He advised me to write to Rev. W. S. Van Cleave, Gettysburg. There was a church Conawago near there, but he replies that there are no such names on their records or tomb-stones; says that there is or was a church of that name in Dauphin county, or-

ganized earlier than his, and suggests that I write to you for information. I hope, therefore, that you will excuse me for troubling you with this matter. It is one of some historical interest.

CONEWAGO CHURCH.

In 1750 the people emigrated here, apparently in colonies, from Pennsylvania. The church of Centre in lower end of this, Iredell, county till 1753; Anson till 1788; Rowan, too, had a set of names, Davidson, Templeton, M'Pherson, Givens, &c. Next north, Fourth creek (now Statesville) had different names—Simonton, Allison, Stevenson, Hall, Mordah, &c. Bethany is a branch of Fourth creek. I am located ten miles from Statesville, and letters reach me either at S. or here, at Cool Springs.

Since the above was written I notice that Dr. Wm. H. Foster in Sketches North Carolina, states that Dr. James Hall was from Carlisle, Pa. I see in Minutes Gen. Ass. Pres. Carlisle, a church Great Conewago, Rev. Joseph Henderson pastor till 1795, when he is w. c. and the church vacant. Do. 1800. But after 1801 Rev. David M'Conaughy pastor. Whether the same I am inquiring for or not I have no means of knowing."

The minutes of the original Presbytery of Donegal were first consulted, and the following relating to this congregation was found:

June 28, 1738. The people of Conewago ask to be erected into a congregation by themselves. P. 237.

August 31, 1738. Terms of separation between the churches of Conewago and Derry. P. 244.

October 8, 1741. Geo. Davidson from Conewago presents to Presbytery a supplication and call for Mr. Black.

April 5, 1743; May 26, 1743, and September 6, 1743. The name of John M'Quown is found in the lists of Ruling Elders. The church represented is not mentioned.

April 4, 1745. Presbytery released Rev. Samuel Black from his pastoral charge at Conewago in order to send him to Virginia to labor.

September 4, 1745. Hugh Hall, commissioner from Conewago, appeared and asked that the relation between Mr. Black and them might be renewed.

September 25, 1745. The above request was granted.

With this much before us, a communication was addressed to the "Journal," at Middletown, Dauphin county. It appeared in that newspaper February, 1877. It brought a response from Samuel Evans, Esq., of Columbia, fixing the locality of the church near Mount Joy, Lancaster county, erected for Rev. John Roan in 1742; or if not that one, one in Adams county, now "Great Conewago."

The call of Rev. Samuel Black was in 1741. He probably had preached to this congregation previously, as he was in the neighborhood, preached at Carlisle, in 1736-37, and presided at the installation of Rev. John Elder at Derry and Paxtang churches in 1738. Upon inquiry it was found that Mr. Black never preached at "Great Conewago."

The question of locality was set at rest, by a communication signed "J. R." in a subsequent issue of the "Journal," in which he truly fixed the site of the church, or its grave-yard, about three-fourths of a mile in an eastern direction from Geinburg—not "Gainesburg," as on the maps—formerly the village of Franklin. The exact location is upon the farm of Mr. J. Alwine, in London-derry township.

- "J. R," (Dr. Ringland, of Middletown,) shows conclusively the ownership of the spot belonging to this extinct organization. He says:
- "The piece of ground belonging to the church was a portion of a larger tract, which was taken on a warrant bearing date the first day of August, 1743, granted to Samuel Clark by the Land Office. The land was afterwards patented to Robert Spear, by patent deed, November 8, 1785, and was called "Spear's Choice," and called for 202\forall acres and the usual allowance. The patent was enrolled in Rolls Office, in Patent Book No. 4, page 99, &c. The following memorandum, accompanying a draft, will explain itself:
- 'Re-surveyed for Robert Spear, August 18, 1785, the above tract of land, containing two hundred and two acres and five-eighths and allowances, situate in Derry township, Dauphin county, late Lancaster, by warrant granted to James Clark, 28th of July, 1743.

 'Signed Barram Galbraith.
- 'N. B. The above square piece of nineteen by twenty perches is a Presbyterian meeting house and burying-grounds.
 To John Lukens, S. G.
- 'Returned into the Land Office the third November, 1785, for John Lukens, Esq., S. G.

"The piece of ground designated as the burying-ground contained somewhat more than two acres. A number of stones, placed to mark the graves of those buried there, are still standing, but many have been carried away and put to other uses. The stones are all undressed red sand stone, without date or any other inscription. The foundation walls of the building still remain, though in a some-

what dilapidated condition. There is nothing on our county records to show when, by whom, or to whom the title for this piece was made.

"The church must have been a very small affair, as the foundation is only about twelve feet by sixteen. A portion of the ground was during the last summer planted in corn. 'Black-haw' and other trees are growing within the area of the church wall. Tradition has it, that the carpenter who built the church fell, from the roof and was killed, and was the first person buried on the ground."

A personal examination of the site of the grave-yard was made in May, 1877, in company of Hon. John Blair Linn, of Bellefonte, Hon. Joseph H. Nisley, of Middletown, and Dr. William H. Egle, of Harrisburg. The enclosure which Dr. R. supposes to have been a church foundation is a dilapidated wall, enclosing the burial-place of some important families. There is no inscriptive stone to tell what it really was. It is about ten by twelve feet. Clearly there is no mark of a church at this spot. What is very remarkable, there is not a tomb-stone, or part of one, with any inscription in the mass-of fragments of such memorials which surround the family enclosure spoken of. The stones are of the red sand stone of the neighboring hills—many of them buried in the earth as taken from the quarry, free from all evidence of manual adornment—weather-beaten as well as rough.

The small space set off for the congregation was part of the lands of Clark & M'Kee. This reservation was as early as 1787, before either of these members of the church had any legal claim to the land, but there was no adverse title, and the gift was a good one.

A warrant was granted 1742—a survey returned, excluding these-two acres, in 1743. In 1785 it was again surveyed, and described as follows:

North 84" west 19 perches. South 56" west 20 perches. South 34" east 19 perches. North 56" east 20 perches.

A great part of this plot was prepared for corn when our company examined it.

After searching all the early assessments of that portion of Dauphin county, from 1725 to 1790, we are inclined to think the following list comprises most, if not all, the heads of families of this congregation from 1745-55. All the names are on the tax list from 1750 to 1766; many for twenty years previously. After the Revolution they disappear year by year, and names of other nationalities take their places:

The foregoing list of names would show a population of about two hundred in 1740.

That part of Dauphin county we are writing of was originally the township of Derry, in Laneaster county, and "set off" at the first court in 1729. In 1768 a part of Derry was "set off" and called Londonderry, "commencing by a road leading from Conewago creek by the Widow Hall's, &c. In 1826 rectification of lines was ordered, when finally, in 1850, Conewago township was "set off" from the east end of Londonderry, leaving the site we have been endeavoring to describe, in Londonderry, a short mile north-east of Geinburg, three miles from Middletown, seven miles from Paxtang church, four miles from Derry Spring, and about six miles from Donegal, all noted Presbyterian settlements.

Another, a family burial-place, is about half a mile west of the one belonging to the Conewago congregation. The inscriptions on the stones scattered about are in German, and all bear the name of "Gein." This spot, as well as its neighbor, is in a disgraceful state of neglect.

The surroundings of the Conewago place of burial are charming and romantic. Almost under the shadow of the frowning "Round Top," on the north and west—the Cornwall Hills on the east—and in the more distant south the South mountain shows its broken front. The farms are kept in very handsome condition, a generous soil is carefully cultivated, the improvements and enclosures substantial,

and at present inhabited almost entirely by persons of German descent. There are not half a dozen families of Scotch-Irish descent in the neighborhood.

Many admirers of the sturdy race who first formed congregations and conquered the virgin soil of this part of Pennsylvania think that the Presbytery of Carlisle should take order on the subject of vacant burial-grounds within its bounds. There are four such plots in Dauphin county, and soon a fifth will be added, if historic "Derry" is allowed to be pulled to pieces to satisfy the curiosity or vandalism of those who use its venerated soil for pic-nics and frolics not quite so reputable.

NOTES.

A perusal of these brief notes will awaken interest in many quarters touching early family records or tradition, and may be the means of establishing the correctness of the narrative, and perhaps of recovering papers whose contents will further elucidate the early history of the settlements along the Susquehanna "above Conewago"—a field of inquiry almost untrodden.

Mr. Black, the only pastor we have been enabled to name, was from Ulster; was licensed by the Newcastle Presbytery in 1735, when he was chosen pastor of the "Forks of Brandywine." In 1738 he presided at the installation of Rev. John Elder, at Paxtang. In October, 1741, he came to "Conewago." In 1743 he appears to have gone "missionary to South Mountain," in Virginia. He died there in 1770 "an aged minister."

Hugh Hall's wife was a daughter of James Roddy, who was on the first grand jury held in Lancaster county, and whose name appears on the assessment of Donegal in 1723. He was active in all the affairs of the Donegal settlement. Roddy resided some miles south of Conewago.

Hugh Hall had a son Hugh Hall, who was an ensign in Colonel (General) Hugh Mercer's "third battalion of sixteen companies, May 4, 1758." Opposite his name on the roll is written "of a reputable and good family in Lancaster county." Their captain was Adam Read, Esquire, the father-in-law of John Harris, by his second marriage, and the lieutenant was John Simpson, father of General Michael Simpson. All these officers were citizens of the territory of what thirty years after became Dauphin county.

The M'Queens so numerous in this congregation have mostly become M'Cunes. The orthography of the list of taxables about 1750

is something wonderful. Just as the assessor talked he wrote. If a man paid his tax he was marked "pate;" if Korr was assessed, he was enrolled Carr, and so with all the rest, even to dropping the national "Mac" from the M'Queens, reducing the name to Queen; in some instances M'Guinne and M'Quown.

The Kerrs came to Conewago in 1780. One of the family became the Rev. William Kerr of Donegal, who married a granddaughter of the Rev. John Elder. Representatives of the family, in almost all its branches, still reside in Dauphin county—an instance of stability and content to be noted in the restless race from which it sprung.

Jane Murdoch, the daughter of John and sister of James, married Thomas Rutherford in 1732. The Murdochs then lived "above Conoy." This marriage has numerous descendants in Dauphin county, and in many of the western counties of this and other States.

The family of Work removed to the west early after the Revolution.

The Clarks are found in all parts of Pennsylvania and the west. A son of one of them was an officer of rank in the Revolution, and some of his descendants yet reside in this county.

A daughter of John M'Queen, Rosanna, married Capt. Jamieson of Donegal.

David M'Nair has descendants yet residing in Dauphin county. I think Hon. John M'Nair, formerly member of Congress from the Montgomery district, informed me that "his people originally settled on the Susquehanna."

Adam Thomas owned a farm just north of the grave-yard, and was uncle to the venerable Mrs. Valentine Egle, of Harrisburg, who died in Harrisburg, August 5, 1867, at the great age of ninety-five. Thomas was a Welshman.

This family of Chambers permanently established themselves below Harris ferry.

James Crouch became a prominent man in Revolutionary times. He was a colonel.

Hugh Black's family has no descendants in the male line.

Both M'Kees were Indian traders. James and his descendants remained on the land he warranted in 1787 until about 1880, when

the family name is lost. The famous Belle of it was an only heir, married, and removed to a distant county. Thomas, about 1758, removed to his "upper farm, about thirty miles from Harris ferry," where he built a fort. He was an officer under Burd at Forts Augusta and Hunter, and his singular orthography figures in long pages of letters printed in the Pennsylvania Archives.

The Wallace family, possibly descendants of the one belonging to this congregation, settled in great force along the Swatara creek, in Derry and Hanover.

The family of Wray were numerous in Hanover at a later date.

Candor and Lenox are names not often found in Dauphin county at present. It is not known to what part of the country they emigrated. One of the name died at Harrisburg forty years ago.

NEW-SIDE GRAVE-YARD.

THE "new side Presbyterians" were those followers of the Tennents, Blairs, Carmichael and others who agreed with them in antagonism to the Synod of Philadelphia. The Newcastle Presbytery being "new side" licensed Rev. John Roan in 1744. He came about 1747 to Derry, Mount Joy and Paxtang, gathering small congregations in each of these localities. It is not known that any other church was erected for him except the one at Mount Joy. His people did not use Paxtang grave-yard, selecting the one we are about to describe for their use.

Its situation is distant from the common routes of the present day, and indeed is known to very few. It is in Lower Paxtang township, Dauphin county, six miles east of Harrisburg, two miles north of Paxtang church, nine miles south-west of Hanover church, on the road from Harrisburg to Hornerstown and Union Deposit. There is no appearance of any structure ever having been erected upon it. Yet it will be seen that there is evidence that a small one was erected on or near the spot. In an advertisement of the day we find that on the eleventh of September, 1795, James Byers and James Willson, executors of William Brown, Esq., deceased, of Paxtang, offered for sale "a log-house near the residence formerly occupied as a house of worship by the Reverend Matthew Lind." This, and the thirty-four acres of land, appears to have been purchased by George Weidman; afterwards by George Shirk; then by Jacob Grove, whose family reside there at present—1877.

The "log-house," formerly occupied as "a house of worship," was used, within the memory of many persons yet living, as a sheep-pen. It stood north of the grave-yard, but close to it. It has disappeared.

The Rev. Mr. Lind was a member of Carlisle Presbytery, and is known to have often preached within its bounds. The enclosure contains less than one acre of ground, and is at present in tolerable

repair. The earliest interment was made in 1750—the last about 1855, showing its use for more than one hundred years.

Many graves unmarked, show that interments have not been made for many years. It has not been used for at least twenty. The liberality and attention of Mr. Robert Stewart, of Hanover, has kept its enclosure in fair condition. Some organization of Presbyterians should take this burial-place in charge, and provide for repairs every few years. Any public-spirited citizen, no matter what his religious affiliations, would cheerfully contribute labor so supreme, and feel true happiness in doing so.

Directly after entering the enclosure we find plain slabs, some of red sand stone, others of more pretentious marble, others of wood, marked as follows:

In the quiet grave-yard at Brown's Mill, six miles south of Chambersburg, Franklin county, Pennsylvania, rest the remains of, perchance, the only pastor of the "New-Side Congregation." On two plain marble slabs, side by side, are the following inscriptions:
