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#### PREFACE.

The facts contained in the following pages have been collected at leisure moments during the past eight years largely because of my desire to know something of my more immediate relatives. As my materials have increased rapidly in value and extent, and as others have become interested in my investigations from time to time, I have had numerous requests to put the results of my work into permanent form. Accordingly my first intention was to publish the history of each family in a separate volume. But as the numerous intermarriages among the families would have required the reprinting of a great deal of the material in each volume, I finally determined to include all the records in one book, cross references being made from one part to another.

As the work on the different families has been carried on largely at different times and in different ways, it will perhaps be noticed that the facts concerning the individuals are more detailed in some places than in others. Yet I have refrained from eulogizing any one, and have simply stated the facts as far as I could obtain them. Hence no literary merit need be expected in the work. Only in the earlier generations have I given many details of the lives of those concerned. The order in which the families are arranged in the book has been determined solely by the order in which they were completed, much of the information having been collected since the printer began work upon the first family some eight months ago. For this reason it may happen that some changes have occurred during the last year which are not recorded in the book.

It is important to note the following explanations:

Each generation is indented to the right of the preceding generation, and in addition is distinguished by the letters or figures preceding the names of the members of that generation. For example, the children of Taliaferro Stribling (p. 35) are preceded by capital letters, A., B., etc. (pp. 36, 76, 84 and 85); the children of each of these by Roman numerals, I., II., etc. (pp. 37, 48, 52, etc.); the next generation by Arabic numerals, 1, 2, etc. (pp. 39, 41, 42, etc.); the next by Arabic numerals in parentheses, (1), (2), etc. (pp. 39-41, etc.); the next by the small letters, a, b, c, etc.; the next by the same in parentheses, (a), (b), etc.; and the next by small italic letters, a, b, etc. By this arrangement relationships and direct lines of ancestry can be easily traced. Thus, Mary Virginia Ellett Cabell (p. 155) is

the second child of Mrs. Nannie Powell McCormick Cabell, who is the second child of Dr. Cyrus McCormick (p. 154), who is the third child of Mrs. Rose Mortimer Ellzey McCormick (p. 153), who is the sixth child of Mrs. Rosannah McIlhany Ellzey (p. 149), who was the second child of James McIlhany (pp. 135) and 137) who was the second child of John McIlhany and Rosannah Stuart (p. 133). All members of the six main families are printed in SMALL CAPS, and those whom they married in italics. It will be observed also that in the family outlines given in the Notes, the names of the direct ancestors of those who married into any of the principal families are given in italics. All places mentioned are in Virginia, unless otherwise noted. Children are living with their parents, when no other place of abode is given. The following abbreviations are used extensively; b.= born, e.= educated, m = married, d.= died, l.= living, ib.= the last mentioned place, p.= parents, gr. p.= grand parents.


I take this opportunity to express my hearty thanks to all who have rendered me any assistance in compiling these records. letters of inquiry have met with uniform courtesy and attention. Every date and other fact has been given upon what ought to be truct morthy authority; yet I have discovered that some of my informants are not as reliable as they might be, especially in the matter of dates; and to this source can be traced most of the errors in the book. In cases where authorities have differed, I have had to use my own judgment in deciding which should be followed. Although particular care has been taken to avoid errors by correcting the proof sheets twice. I am sure some mistakes will be detected, particularly in the Notes, which are approximately correct, though by no means complete. I shall greatly appreciate it, therefore, if any reader who discovers a mistake, no matter how small it may be, will inform me of it at once, stating upon what authority the change should be made. I am especially anxious to get any additional facts not given here, particularly regarding the earlier members of the families. One side of each page has been left blank, so that each person can enter in his own book at the proper place any addition or correction that may be necessary from time to time. An index, in which only the heads of families are listed, is given at the end of the book.

### THE KINNEY FAMILY.

William Kinney, with whom this record begins, owned property, purchased October 13, 1779, on the south side of Hardware River, near Scottsville in Albemarle County, and adjacent to the Fluvanna County line. Here he reared his family consisting of three sons and one daughter-Jacob, Ann, Chesley and William. Where his home was prior to 1779 is not known. He was born about 1725, and was most probably a son of Capt. William Kenney of Blisland Parish, New Kent County, ' was a vestryman of the parish from 1724 to 1735, church warden in 1721 and 1729, and a magistrate of the County. The maiden name of his wife Mary Kinney is said by some to have been Chesley, in which way Chesley became a family name with the Kinneys: others think her name was Moon: but of her aucestry nothing definite has yet been learned. The old Family Bible was destroyed by fire shortly after the Civil War, making it impossible to give all dates exactly; but William and Mary Kinney were married about the year 1764. They took great care to give their children as good an education as could be secured in those troubled times of the Revolution, for in after life they showed the results of such early training. Their two sons Jacob and Chesley removed to Augusta County early in life, and while on a visit to them about the year 1794 William Kinney, Sr., was taken sick and died. On February 16, 1795 his property in Albemarle County was sold by "Chesley Kinney and Mary his wife, Jacob Kinney and Ann his wife, of the County of Augusta, and William Kinney, James Whitesides and Nancy his wife, of the County of Amherst, heirs of William Kinney, dec'd." His wife then moved to Augusta to be with her sons, and about the same time William Kinney, Jr., and Nancy Whitesides also settled there. Mary Kinney died "Jan" 3rd. 1805, aged about 78 years", and was buried by the side of her husband in the Tinkling Spring Church yard, about seven miles east of Staunton.

Only one-fifth of the nearly six hundred descendants of William and Mary Kinney have borne the name of Kinney. of the family have served as clerks of the county and circuit courts of Augusta, five have been Mayors of Staunton, and four have represented the county in the two houses of the Virginia Legislature. In Johnston's "Memorials of Virginia Clerks" Judge Hugh W. Sheffey says of this "remarkable family of clerks": "The Kinneys were, as it were, born clerks. The qualities and attributes which make up the characters of good clerks seem to have been hereditary and belonged to the race. They all rote well; they had memories unsurpassed in tenacity and accuracy; and were methodical and orderly; and were as faithful and true to their official duties as any men who ever filled offices of any sort in the Valley or the State. They enjoyed the unwavering confidence of the people and of the bar and the bench Litted a class of citizens of great conservative influence in the community, and I verily believe they contributed largely to the tone and characteristics of the people of this county. They were honored, followed, looked up to for advice and guidance, and swayed the public sentiment and opinion of the county in favor of right, justice and civil integrity; and they helped greatly to make the citizens of old Augusta what they certainly once were. and I trust will ever be-that is, reverential respecters of law and or ler, and promoters of private honor and public welfare. I could mention many instances of their great influence as leaders of public opinion, and of their marked success in guiding it aright. Death and dispersions have broken up the brotherhood. and the influence so powerful and salutary is dissolved and gone."

For twenty years after coming to Augusta the Kinneys were connected with the Presbyterian church; but on the reorganization of the Episcopal congregation between 1811 and 1820, they returned to that communion. "None of them in early life", says Mr. Sheffey, "became communicants of the church; amid the shadows of declining years they made their profession of faith. But from 1828 down, they were the very bulwarks and

supporters of the Episcopal church, and by their influence and large moneyed contributions, sestained it as if they had been confirmed members of the same, and they all lived to see their labors of love crowned with abundant blessings, and to share in its benedictions".

Jacob Kinney moved from Albemarle to Augusta about the time of his marriage. On Aug. 21, 1792, he gave bond for one thousand pounds as Clerk of the County Court of Augusta, in which position he served for eight years. He was a lawyer by profession, and was very prominently connected with various affairs of town, county and state. He served as a member of the Staunton Board of Aldermen in 1804; as Recorder of the town in 1° 5; and as Mayor in 1806. From 1805 to 1809 he was a member of the Virginia House of Delegates, and was intimately associated with the first men of the time, once being prominently mentic d for the governorship. As an intimate friend of William Wirt, the historian, he often staved at the latter's home when visiting Richmond. The following is part of a business letter, written one week after Mr. Kinney's death, of which the writer had not heard, thus illustrating the slowness with which information could then be communicated:

Richmond, March 22, 1812.

My dear Kinney.

How are you my dear old friend— the memory of former times comes over me as I write to you, and fills me with a kind of pleasing melancholy— Are we ne'er to see you more in these precincts— O! the days and I may add the nights too, that we have seen!

— But grieving's a folly— You have many friends here, whose hearts beat most warmly towards you— We often talk you over— I wish you would come down and let us rub you over—God bless you and all who are dear to you— My love to Mrs. Kinney—your daughter, Mr. S. [Stribling.]

Your friend till death,

WM. WIRT.

It is said that Mr. Wirt also wrote the following epitaph, the original draft of which is still preserved, and which is inscribed upon the stone that covers Mr. Kinney's grave in Trinity Church yard at Staunton:

Here lies the body

of

JACOB KINNEY

nat. 24th. July 1765,

ob. 15th. March 1812.

He was born in the county of Fluvanna [?]
and Emigrated to this county
shortly after he reached the years of

manhood.

The public utility of his life is acknowledged by all who knew him.

A heart

of great sensibility and benevolence formed for friendship the most sincere and disinterested:

> A temper gay and ardent; A disposition frank and generous;

> > A mind

prompt, vigorous, fertile, and original in all its sallies;

A soul

intrepid, noble and magnanimous, Once animated the dust that moulders here.

The affection of a wife

and the filial love of a daughter & only child

have placed this stone

to his memory.

In 1795 Mr. Kinney bought the property now known as the Virginia Waukesha Springs about two miles from Staunton, and built the house which still remains. This home called "Oak Hill" descended to his only child Mrs. Matilda Stribling. Besides other property in Staunton, he owned a stone tavern in the town of Warren in Albemarle, and a ferry on the James River at the same place, which he leased at a large sum annually.

The profile portrait of Mr. Kinney given herewith was made in the year 1808, by the famous French artist St. Memin, several original copies of which are in the possession of his descendants.

Mrs. Nancy Kinney was a woman of great force of character, and was a prominent member of the Presbyterian church. It is said that she and Judge Archibald Stuart were the only two persons in the county at one time who owned a four-wheeled carriage. The annual license costing eleven dollars was made out in the name of her son-in-law in 1815. She survived her husband twelve years, and is buried by his side in the Trinity Church yard.

Mrs. Nancy Whitesides was always considered a remarkaable woman. "She was possessed of a vigorous intellect, and agreeable and entertaining conversational powers, ever enlivening her companions with original humor and happily told anecdotes, of which she had an unabating fund. She remembered with historical accuracy and narrated with interest facts and incidents of the eventful era in which she was reared", recalling particularly the raid of the British under General Tarlton, when the army passed before her father's house.

About 1795 James Whitesides went with his brother Samuel from Amherst County to purchase land in Tennessee. They obtained land near Bean Station in Grainger County, where his brother remained; but as he was returning for his family he was drowned in crossing the Tennessee River. His brother stayed in Tennessee and prospered, but died unmarried. After her husband's death Nancy Whitesides removed with her infant daughter Sarah from Amherst to Augusta County, and lived near Tinkling Spring Church until her daughter's marriage, and thereafter with her son-in-law Joseph Trout.

For several years in early life Mr. Kinney taught school near Jonesboro, now in Nelson County but then in Albemarle. After his marriage he removed to Augusta County, where at first he continued to teach. He lived in Staunton till 1808, when his home called "Walnut Grove", about two miles to the west of Staunton, was purchased. It is still in the possession of his family. In 1807 he served as Mayor of Staunton, and was several times elected to the Board of Aldermen previous to his removal to "Walnut Grove". He was Clerk of the County Court of Augusta from 1800 to July 1, 1812; was Clerk of the District Court of Law, succeeding Micajah Coulter some time during the same period; and was first Clerk of the Circuit Court of Law from 1809 till 1828, though after 1812 he was obliged to retire from all active service, having been stricken with paralysis about that time. While for nearly twenty years before his death he suffered in bed, his oldest son, Nicholas C. Kinney, performed the duties of his office. He was quite intimate with Thomas Jefferson, who visited Staunton on several occasions, and for whom he named one of his sons. His will made Oct 5, 1811 was proved in court Jan. 26, 1830.

Mrs. Kinney was a daughter of Samuel Edmunds of Amherst. It is said that her mother was a Miss Lewis of Albemarle. She and her husband were buried in Trinity Church yard, but their graves were effaced in making room for the walk which leads to the Parish Building. They had six children, as follows:

Mr. Kinney served as a lieutenant in the regular army in the War of 1812. After his return from the war, he

served as deputy to his bedridden father, as Clerk of the Circuit Court of Law, and succeeded him as Clerk from March 24, 1828 to 1831. He was then appointed the first Clerk of the Circuit Superior Court of Law and Chancery, in which capacity he served for twenty-eight years till the time of his death, when he was buried with military and masonic honors. At the final reorganization of the Episcopal Church in 1820, he was one of its first vestrymen. He was a member of the town Council in 1827 and 1828, and was Recorder of the town in 1829. In the "Memorials of Virginia Clerks' Judge Sheffey wrote of him, - "He was surpassed by no clerk in the State of Virginia as a lucid writer and an accurate draftsman of decrees and orders of the court.......... He was a patient laborer, a most popular officer, and as true a friend as man ever had. His memory was marvellous; and this valuable faculty has descended to his children and grand-children to a remarkable degree." His obituary speaks of him as "the brave soldier, the accomplished gentleman, the kind, tender friend, the pleasant, cheerful, and sympathizing companion, and above all; the pure Christian". He had four children by each marriage, as follows:



§ 16. Rev. Edgar Woods in his "History of Albemarle County", p. 286, says that "two persons named Morris obtained patents for land in 1743, Hugh on the lower Hardware, and Jacob on Totier Creek. They were, as their names indicate, of Welsh

June 30, 1743 Jacob Morris, patented 437 acres in Goochland County, afterwards Albemarle. In his will, made Nov. 25, 1801, and approved in court in June 1806, he mentions his wife Jane Morris, his sons Powell and Benjamin Morris, and his grand-daughter MATILDA KINNEY, child of his daughter Ann Morris wife of Jacob Kinney. See §2. His personal estate was appraised at \$4,587.00 at the time of his death. He and his brother Hugh both left large families, but it is said that none of their descendants remain in the County to-day.

# Note 2. Whitesides Family.

§ 17. William Whitesides, evidently of English parentage, patented two tracts of land in Albemarle County, one of 400 acres March 15, 1741, and the other of 181 acres July 20, 1768. ### Note 5. Porterfield Fumily.

- § 20. This family, which settled originally in Pennsylvania, is said to be of Scotch-Irish descent. Two brothers, Charles and William, removed to Frederick County, Virginia, at an early date, the latter being the ancestor of Col. G. A. Porterfield of Charlestown, W. Va., and of numerous other descendants living in the lower Valley. *Charles Porterfield* had at least four children:
- 1. Charles Porterfield, Jr., distinguished himself in the War of the Revolution, attaining the rank of Lieut-Colonel, and died from the effects of a wound received at the disastrous battle of Camden. He never married.
- 2. Eleanor Porterfield married William Heath, Attorney-General of Kentucky, but left no children.
- 3. Rebecca Porterfield lived with her brother Robert, and died at an old age unmarried.
- 4. Robert Porterfield, known as General Porterfield, was also highly distinguined in the Revolutionary Army. His military at the War Department and given in Heitservice, as recon er' of the officers of the Continental man's "Historica. Army, was as follows:—"2nd Lieut. 11th Va., 24th Dec, 1776; 1st Lieut, 1st June 1777; Adjutant, 19th Apr. 1778; transferred to 7th Va. 14th Sep. 1778; Capt. Lieut., 2d July 1779; Capt., 16th Aug. 1779; taken prisoner at Charleston, 12th May, 1780; transferred to 2d Va., 12 Feb, 1781, and served to close of W He then settled in Augusta County, on Oct. 8th, 1784 purchasing a fine estate below Waynesboro on South River, which he called "Soldiers' Retreat". Here he died Feb. 13, 1843. There is in the possession of Dr. C. P. Kinney of Crossville, Ill., an old parchment signed by George Washington, being the certificate of membership of Capt. Robt. Porterfield in the Society of the Cincinnati, an organization instituted by the officers of the American Army at the close of the Revolution. He was at one time Colonel of the state militia, and during the War of 1812 was commissioned

Brigadier General of Virginia Volunteers; hence the title by which he was commonly known. He married Rebecca Farrar, daughter of Peter Farrax of Amelia County, by whom he had four children:

# THE STRIBLING FAMILY.

There is a tradition preserved among some of the Striblings of Tennessee to the effect that this family is of Polish origin, the name having been originally spelled Striblinski, and that Thomas Stribling, the first of the name in this country, and said to have been closely related to one of the kings of Poland, was exiled from his native land because of his political or religious views or both. While I have been unable to find any historical basis for such a theory, the plausibility of the Polish origin of the name is borne out by the recurrence of the names Sigismund and Casimir in the different branches of the family. I am inclined to believe, however, that even if the name had such an origin, there must have been a sojourn of a generation or two in England before the emigration of the family to this country. There are Striblings residing in England today whose ancestors lived in Devonshire; and at the very time that Thomas Stribling settled in Virginia, one Benjamin Stribling with his family resided at Lavenham, Suffolk, England.

THOMAS STRIBLING probably came to America about the year 1710, and settled in Stafford County, Virginia. On July 11, 1727 there was granted to "Thomas Striblin of Stafford County" 1050 acres "on the middle grounds twixt Broad Run of Occaquan and Bull Run", which property was in that part of Stafford which shortly afterwards became Prince William County. Here he resided, in Dettinger Parish, about twenty years, when he removed to Frederick County. In 1752 "Thomas Stribling of Prince William, Gent." purchased 600 acres of land near Winchester. He died in 1755, his will being recorded March 25, 1755 in Prince William County, his sons Francis and Taliaferro qualifying as executors: but the will book was lost or destroyed

luring the Civil War. His estate in Frederick County was appraised May 3, 1755, and that in Prince William May 26, 1755. shortly after 1715 he married Elizabeth Taliaferro, daughter of John Taliaferro of Essex, who represented that County in the House of Burgesses in 1699 (see \$87). On account of the loss of his will, the names of all his children cannot be given with certainty. The three oldest are named in the will of Robert Taliaferro of Essex (dated Dec. 3, 1725; approved June 21, 1726). who mentions his sister Elizabeth, the wife of "Thomas Stripling", and her sons Francis, William, and Taliaferro "Stripling". Francis Stribling and Dorothy his wife were living in Prince William County in 1775. He inherited part of his father's estate in that County, but nothing further is known of him. Stribling moved to Frederick County, and died there unmarried(?) in 1748, his father qualifying as his executor Feb. 7, 1748-9. Taliaferro Stribling also settled in Frederick County, as shown below

That there were other children of Thomas and Elizabeth Stribling besides these three cannot be doubted. Thomas Stribling, the progenitor of the South Carolina branch of the family, was surely one of them (see \$72). On July 23, 1754 one Colclough Stribling was paid for traveling 45 miles to and from the Prince William Court as a witness. On Feb 7, 1744 a tract of 119 acres was granted to Benjamin Stribling of Prince William County. A Samuel Stripling, aged thirty-three, enlisted in Caroline County in Capt. Mercer's Company on Dec 4, 1754, to fight the Indians. These must have been sons either of Thomas Stribling or of a brother who came to this country with him. That there was such a brother is indicated by the inventory of a William Stribling, deceased, recorded in Stafford County in 1765, the said William being either a brother or nephew of the first Thomas. I am convinced that Capt. Sigismund Stribling of the Revolutionary Army was a son of this Thomas. He is called "Uncle Sigismund" in several letters of the grand-children of Taliaferro Stribling, but could hardly have been the latter's son, as will be shown below. He was very old at the time of his death at "Hopewell" in 1816, having been born hardly later than 1740. He was a bachelor, and left his property to his name-sake, Sigismund Stribling, son of Francis Stribling, \$45. Heitman's "Historical Register" of the Officers of the Continental Army gives the following record of his service: "2nd lieut 12th Va, Dec. 1776; 1st lieut, 10th May, 1777; regiment designated 8th Va., 14th Sep, 1778; Capt. —1781, and served to——''. The Revolutionary Records in the State Land Office show that on June 21, 1783, 466633 acres of land were granted to Capt. Sigismund Stribling for seven years service. On Oct. 23, 1807, 833 acres additional were granted to "Capt Segismond Stribling as Captain of the Continental line for one year and three months service more than seven years". There is also a warrant for 400 acres, Oct 22, 1784, to William Stribling as Sergeant of the Continental Line, who enlisted for the war and served through. This was doubtless the same William Stribling who was pensioned in Fauquier County in 1818 for Revolutionary Service. There was a Benjamin Stribling, who, with his wife, Ann Vawters, and several children (Thomas T., George, Willis, and others), moved from Fauquier County, Va., to Scott County, Kentucky, about 1795, and who has left numerous descendants in Tennessee, Indiana and other western states. This Benjamin and the last mentioned William were evidently brothers, and perhaps sons of Francis or Benjamin Stribling, sons of the original Thomas Stribling.

Taliaferro Stribling, son of Thomas and Elizabeth Taliaferro Stribling, was born in Stafford County about 1723. In early manhood he moved with his father to Frederick County, and at the latter's death inherited the 600 acre plantation referred to above. This he "and Elizabeth his wife" sold Nov. 7, 1771, the deed stating that the property had been willed to him by his father Thomas Stribling. On Oct. 16, 1771 he purchased the estate called "Hopewell", which descended to his son Francis. His will, made Oct. 4, 1774, was recorded in the Frederick court Dec. 7, 1774. His personal estate, including 30 negroes, was appraised April 24, 1775 at £1569. I have not been able to determine accurately the maiden name of his wife Elizabeth. The uniform tradition in the family has been that this Stribling, name unknown, married a Mary Taliaferro of Gloucester County, sister of the Elizabeth Taliaferro who married Edward Snickers of Frederick (see §91). This could not have been the case. The fact that his own name was Taliaferro and that his mother was Elizabeth Taliaferro is sufficient ground for

tradition. And his wife was certainly named Elizabeth, as Jown by the deed referred to above. I conjecture that her name WAS Elizabeth Wright, for the following reasons. Two of their grand-children, Elizabeth Stribling Wright Milton and Dr. Matthew Wright Stribling, bore that name, and I know of no other source from which it could have come. Then there is on record in Prince William County, dated March 29, 1742, the will of one Francis Wright, son of John Wright of that County, mentioning his wife Anne, and three young daughters, names not given. Sigismund Massey of Stafford County, probably a relative of the Striblings, was executor of the will. A short while after the death of Francis Wright, Thomas Stribling, Sr., was appointed guardian of these children. If Taliaferro Stribling had, about 1755, married one of these daughters, named Elizabeth, with whom he must have been well acquainted, all the facts in the case would be explained, as well as the origin of the name of his only daughter Anne Milton.

Taliaferro and Elizabeth Stribling had at least six children. In his will he leaves to his son Francis Stribling "the land whereon I live on condition he pay my son Taliaferro 100.0 as soon as he become 21 years of age". After the payment of his just debts, the rest of his estate was to be divided equally among "my six children—Francis, Taliaferro, Ann, Thomas, William and John''. From the wording of this will I conclude that Francis, at that time only eighteen years of age, was the oldest child; that Taliaferro was the second: that the other children are named in the order of their ages, this fact being supported by the dates of their marriages and other points to be mentioned later; that they were all, therefore, under age at the time; that those six were all of his children; and that his wife had died between the years 1771 and 1774, as she is not mentioned in the will. This of course excludes Capt. Sigismund Stribling (see §22) from the number of his children, and shows that they were brothers. He died Oct. 5, 1774, and was buried at "Hopewell". The following are his descendants:

see \$88); they were both interred at "Hopewell". He inherited this estate from his father, and lived there all his life, by his industry and thrift accumulating a great amount of property. Here all of his ten children were born, and to them he gave the best education available. He was a man of lasting influence in the community, being especially interested in the public charities of the county. At the time of his death his personal property was valued at \$8000.00, while his landed possessions were very large. In his will, made June 4, 1823 and approved Oct. 6, 1823, he mentions his children,-Erasmus, Taliaferro, Francis, Magnus T., Thomas, George W., Nancy Neill, and Margaret P. Pennybacker; the children of his daughter Mary T. Crawford, deceased; and the daughter and only child of his son Sigismund, deceased. The "Hopewell" estate he left to his wife Nancy, to be sold at her death and equally divided among his children. Accordingly in 1826 it was sold to Fayette Washington, and the name was changed to "Waverly". His son Dr. Taliaferro Stribling qualified as executor of his will on a bond of \$70,000.00.

A notice written at the time of his death, says in part of Mr. Stribling,—"Endowed in a remarkable degree with all those mental and social qualities which fit a man for usefulness and endear him to society, it was his privilege during his long life to fill many honorable and important stations". He studied at Washington College, Lexington, Va., during the sessions of 1800-1803. While he was at an early date a merchant in Staunton, by profession he was a lawyer. The well known Stribling Springs property was owned and developed by him, from whom it derived its name. In early life he was for several years Clerk of the old District Court of the Sweet Springs. On Aug. 29, 1812 he was elected Clerk of the County Court of Augusta (to which county he had removed in 1805), and held that office till July, 1831. In 1846 he was appointed Clerk of the U.S. Court for the Western District of Virginia, which office he resigned in 1857, because of his advanced age and infirmity. Besides these positions he was, at different times, a Justice of the Peace for the County of Augusta, Clerk of the Corporation Court, Recorder of the town of Staunton in 1814, '15 and '17, and Mayor in 1816 and '18. On July 21, 1812 he was commissioned Captain of a company of Artillery of the Virginia militia, but was never called upon for active service. In 1816 he served with General Robert Porterfield and General John Brown as Commissioner of Elections for his district. be said with perfect truth that all the trusts confided to him were discharged with fidelity, industry and unusual ability. His social qualities were of the very first order. Hospitable, sympathetic and well informed, it was impossible for any one to know him and not to love him. days of his prosperity his hospitable board was the great centre of attraction for all: and the charms of his conversation, the freedom of his entertainments, and his well known benevolence of disposition, made his house the resort of fashion as well as the shelter of the distressed. For many years before his death, the cloud of an adverse fortune and the death of a beloved wife, had closed his hospitable door, and dispersed his large and interesting family. But still he was cheerful—still beloved, and in his latter years he exhibited what he had no opportunity of exhibiting before: that nobie, manly nature, which enabled him to withstand the shock of adversity." same strain Judge Sheffey writes in the "Memorials of Virginia Clerks': "He was a man of rare intelligence and geniality of nature, a fine talker, and warm hearted and devoted in his friendships. During the time, at least the earlier part of the time, he held the office of County Clerk, he was one of the foremost men of the county in wealth, prosperity, possessions and influence, and no one was more cordially beloved by all in the community than he. heart was filled with gentle, almost womanly, affections, and he scattered his favors and kindnesses around him with a lavish hand."

When the Episcopal congregation was permanently organized at Staunton in 1820, Mr. Stribling was amongst the foremost with his efforts and with his purse, and was

a member of the first vestry elected. While in early life he had been somewhat dissipated and careless concerning religion, for many years preceding his death he was a most worthy and exemplary member of the Church. When it was impossible for his family to attend worship Sunday mornings at the church in town, it was always his custom to have the service and a sermon read for them and their servants at "Oak Hill", their country home. Of his 140 descendants, only eleven living bear the name of Stribling.

Mrs. Stribling was a woman of unusual attractiveness. Several pictures are extant which were painted by her at the age of sixteen. She died in the very prime of life, leaving a family of eleven children, as follows:


- §72. Thomas Stribling, the progenitor of the South Carolina branch of the family, was undoubtedly the son of Thomas and Elizabeth Taliaferro Stribling (see §22). While I have no positive proof of this connection, the following facts seem to indicate its certainty. Mr J. W. Stribling of Seneca, S. C., writes that he has been unable to trace his ancestors further back than to Thomas Stribling who emigrated from Berryville, Va., to Union County, S. C. The uniform tradition among the family of Rear Admiral Cornelius Stribling has been that this Thomas Stribling, said to have been of Swedish and Welsh descent (?). "left Berryville, then Battletown, when quite young, his father giving him a horse, gur and colored man, with which to seek his fortune in the world" and that he finally settled in South Carolina. Dr. S. S. Neill (8 51), who was always considered an authority in such matters, wrote some years before his death that Taliaferro Stribling (§23), though he did not know that this was his name, had a brother who came with him and his father from Prince William County to Frederick County, and who afterwards removed to South Carolina and became the ancestor of the Striblings of that State. One thing is certain, that the members of the two branches who have been acquainted have always claimed a close kinship with one another.
- \$73. It can be safely said, therefore, that Thomas Stribling, born in Prince William County about 1730, moved first to Frederick County and thence, shortly after 1750, to South Carolina, where he settled on Seneca River in what is now Anderson County. He afterwards married Nancy Kincheloe, said to have been of English and Irish parentage. She may have been a sister or a daughter of Cornelius Kincheloe (son of John Kincheloe), who was Surveyor of Prince William County in 1768; for his name occurs frequently among her descendants. They had a family of at least four children,—Thomas, Jesse, Lucy (m. —— Trimmier), and Nancy (m. —— Tate). There was perhaps a fifth child, Sigismund, whose son John B. Stribling moved from South Carolina to Tennessee in 1834, and was the ancestor of Striblings now living at Clifton, Lawrenceburg and other places in that State. A history of Tennessee published in 1886 states that this

John B. Stribling was "an own cousin of Commodore Cornelius K Stribling". The names Sigismund, Casimir and Kincheloe occur in this branch of the family, indicating the connection with the other branches.

Because of lack of time I have not attempted to trace the descendants of Thomas and Nancy Stribling in detail, and for the following outline of the families of their two sons Thomas and Jesse I am indebted almost entirely to Mr. C. K. Stribling (§75) of Fort Griffin, Texas, and to Miss Mary Stribling (§82) of Walhalla, S. C. These facts are given without verification on my part with the hope that they may some time be used as the basis of a more extended history of that branch of the family.

## Note 1. Taliaferro and Smith Families.

\$87. Robert Taliaferro, Gent., the founder of this family in Virginia, and undoubtedly of English parentage, settled in Gloucester county in 1636 where he received a large grant of land. He also owned extensive possessions in what is now Essex County. He married a daughter of the Reverend Charles Grymes of Middlesex County, and had at least five sons,—Francis (m. Elizabeth Catlett), John (m. Sarah Smith), Richard, Charles, and Robert (m. Sarah Catlett).

John Taliaferro was born about 1660 and died in 1720, his will (made June 1, 1715) being probated in the Essex Court June 21, 1720. About 1682 he married Sarah Smith, daughter of Col. Lawrence Smith of Gloucester county (see below). On June 19, 1699 he gave bond as sheriff of Essex County, and in the same year represented his county in the House of Burgesses. That he was prominent in the early Colonial Wars with the Indians is shown by the record of Oct. 31, 1692, in the Calendar of Virginia State Papers, that "Lieut John Taliaferro gives return of his expenses in Tobacco, as Ranger with eleven men & two Indians", etc. The records of York and Essex Counties show that his children were, -Lawrence, John, Charles, Robert, Zachariah, Richard, William, Mary, Elizabeth (who married THOMAS STRIB-LING, §22), Sarah and Catherine. It is this last named Robert Taliaferro of St. Paul's Parish, Stafford County, who, in his will dated Dec. 3, 1725 and recorded in the Essex Court June 21, 1726, mentions his sister Elizabeth, the wife of "Thomas Stripling", and her sons Francis, William and Taliaferro "Stripling".

Col. Lawrence Smith, of Abingdon Parish. Gloucester County, was a man of great influence and wealth in his day. He bore the coat-of-arms of the Smiths of Tottne, County Devonshire, England, from which place he had perhaps emigrated to the Colony. His wife's name was Mary ......, and his will was dated Aug. 8, 1700, but no copy of it has been preserved. He was surveyor for the counties of Gloucester and York in 1686, and in 1691 laid out the town of Yorktown. In 1699 he was recommended by the Governor among the "gentlemen of estate and standing" suitable for appointment to the Council, but his

death the following 'year prevented the bestowal of this honor upon him. He was conspicuous also as a leader in the early Colonial Wars. In 1676 he commanded "111 men out of Gloucester Co." at a fort near the falls of the Rappahannock River, and the same year he led the "trained bands" of Gloucester against the rebels under Bacon. The following were his children, as far as is known:—

## Note 2. Tate Family.

§88 Magnus Tate, the first of the name in this country, emigrated from the Orkney Islands, north of Scotland, and landed at Philadelphia May 20, 1696, eventually locating in that part of Frederick County, Virginia, which finally became Jefferson County, West Virginia. He is said to have died in Sept. 1747. On May 2, 1749. Honour Tate, evidently his wife, qualified in the Frederick Court as administratrix of his estate. The inventory of his property was filed May 8, 1749. She must have died shortly afterwards, since it is recorded that on August 16, 1750 Magnus Tate qualified as administrator of Honour Tate, dec'd., and the inventory of her estate was filed Oct. 29, 1750. Their home was near Charlestown, now in Jefferson County, W. Va. As far as is known, they had only one child.

## THE TROUT FAMILY.

§94. From the traditions preserved in several branches of the Trout 'mily today, it would seem that many years before the Revolutionary War three brothers, Lutherans, fleeing from religious persecution in Germany, emigrated from the neighborhood of Frankfort-on-the-Main and settled at Germantown, Pennsylvania. One of them, Nathaniel (?), remained in Pennsylvania; the second, Daniel (?), removed to Frederick County, Virginia: and the third, Jeremiah (?), who never married was a Lutheran minister and a chaplain in the Army during the Revolution. sermon preached by him the evening before the battle of the Brandywine was published in Harper's Magazine many years ago, but was there attributed to a Joab or Jacob Trout. His Bible, in which all his texts were marked with red ink, was preserved un-'til about fifty years ago, when it was lost. Several heir-looms still remain, including an old hundred-year almanac, bound in leather and preserved in a leather case, printed in German in the vear 1699, and illustrated with curious woodcuts. The name was originally spelled Traut, meaning in German, "lovely" or "dear". One thing is uniformly said,—that these ancestors for many generations have been a God-fearing, honest and industrious people. An examination of the court and other records of Philadelphia County, Pa., and Frederick County, Va., shows that this tradition is in the main correct, though the names of the original immigrants have been handed down inaccurately. The following account of the family is based upon these records.

About 1740, there were three brothers. John Balthazar (generally called Baltzer). George and Jeremias Trout, residing at Germantown, Pa., their names being spelled indiscriminately Trout and Traut. They were among the earliest settlers at Germantom and Traut.



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mown, George Trout owning 28 acres and Baltzer Trout 25 ares of land there. I am not at all sure that they emigrated from Germany about that time, but am inclined to believe that they were sons of one "John Trout of Upper Dublin Township in Philadelphia County, yeomen", who in his will, made April, 3, 1728, and approved May 7, 1728, mentions his wife Catharine, his eldest son John as his executor, and his youngest son Philip, but does not give the names of his other children. This oldest son may have been the John Baltzer Trout mentioned above; and all the names occur frequently in the Trout family. Though I could find no proof of this connection, there was nothing to disprove it.

George Ti at died in July, 1745. In his will, made July 17, 1745 and approved August 3, 1745, in which he calls himself George Troud of Germantown, yeoman", he mentions his wife Cassie, his daughters Leaney (?) and Catherine, his son Henry, and five other children not named. John Baltzer Trout was one of the witnesses to the will. Jeremias Trout may have been the minister referred to in the tradition above. Nothing further is known of him.

- JOHN BALTZER TROUT, perhaps the oldest of the three brothers, died in the year 1750. There is no will of his on record, and the name of his wife is not known; but on May, 26, 1747, he made a will respecting certain property jointly with his brother Jeremias Trout, in which are mentioned "our beloved sons and cousins Jacob, Balthazer and Jeremias Trout (the three sons of John Balthazar Trout)". It would appear that his wife had died and that these were his only sons. The will was probated June 21, 1750, John B. Trout having died shortly before that date, Jeremias Trout surviving him. His son Baltzer Trout died in Nov. 1762, his will mentioning his wife Barbara Trout, his daughter Mary, and his brother-in-law Nicholas Rittenhouse. His other son Jeremias Trout died in 1789, his will naming his wife Hannah, and his five children, Margaret, Bottes (?), Hannah, William and John. One striking feature of nearly all these early wills is the fact that special provision is made for the thorough education of the children of the testators.
- \$96. Jacob Trout, son of John B. Trout, removed about 1760 from Germantown to Frederick County, Va., and settled at Newtown (also called Stephensburg, but now Stephens City).


There was a Nicholas Trout living in that county in 1752, but whether he was related to the family or not, is not known. Jacob Trout died shortly before April 5, 1774, for on that date Barbara Trout and Jacob Trout, Jr., are mentioned as administrators of Jacob Trout, deceased. His wife was Barbara Klein, who came to this country from Germany about 1750. She lived to an old age, dying at Newtown after 1812. Her grand children used to love to visit her and hear the stories she would relate to them about her childhood in the Fatherland. She was perhaps a sister of Adam Klein, who in his will, made December 9, 1799 and approved Dec. 1, 1800, named among others, his son-in-law Daniel Trout (see \$37), his daughter Barbara Grapes, his brother Jacob and his sons Michae and John. Jacob and Barbara Trout had at least six children, -Jacob, Baltzer, Daniel, Philip, Henry and Catherine. It is said that there were one or two other sons who moved to Tennessee or Georgia.

In his will, made Feb. 1, 1790 and approved April 8, 1790, he mentions his mother Barbara Trout, his sister Catherine Boyers and her son, Henry Trout the son of his brother Baltzer Trout, and his brothers Philip, Daniel and Henry. His brother Baltzer was his executor.

## Note 1. Lambert Family.

- §111. Christopher Lambert emigrated to this country from Germany about the year 1750. A letter is extant, written to him by a relative from Frankfort-on-the-Main. May 20, 1787, in which full information is given about the families of his two brothers and three sisters who lived in Germany, particular mention being made of the fact that his brother John Nicholas was then residing at Jugenheim "in his father's and grand-father's house". This shows that the ancestral seat was at Jugenheim. It is not known who Christopher Lambert's wife was. He owned property in Winchester, granted him by Lord Thomas Fairfax Nov. 15, 1753, which he sold May 7, 1762. His home thereafter was at Strasburg in Shenandoah County. The names and dates of birth of his ten children are preserved in an old book, written in German.

## THE MCILHANY FAMILY.

\$112. John McIlhany of Scotland was the founder of this family in America. I have not attempted to trace his home or ancestors prior to the time of his coming to this country. He was an ardent supporter of Charles Edward, the "Young Pretender", grandson of James II of England, and followed him faithfully from the time that he landed in Scotland, July 25, 1745, till his final defeat at Culloden Moor, April 16, 1746. With many of the survivors of this unfortunate struggle he was compelled to leave the country immediately. He was at the time about to be married to Rosannah Stuart, who her daughter Hannah Parker and other immediate descendants always said was a near relative of the Young Pretender, and thus a member of the Royal Stuart family. They were hurriedly married and sailed for America, landing at Yorktown, Virginia. They soon made their way to that portion of Fairfax County which in 1757 became Loudoun County. A deed in the Fairfax court records dated Feb. 16, 1756, speaks of him as John McIlhany, Farmer, and mentions Rosannah his wife and Thomas McIlhanv his He seems to have acquired quite a good deal of property in Loudoun County and some in Botetourt County. On July 12, 1757, he was appointed by the Governor as a member of the first bench of County Justices, and in that capacity he served almost continuously till the time of his death. On Nov. 5, 1768 he was commissioned by Lord Botetourt, the Governor of the Colouy, as High Sheriff of the County. The original commission is now hanging in the Chairman's office at the University of Virginia. In Nov. 1769 he is spoken of in the Order Book as "John McIlhany of the Parish of Cameron in the County of Loudoun, Gent. Sheriff." It may not be out of place to say that in those

third was composed of a body of gentlemen selected and appointed by the Governor for their standing and intelligence, who served without salary or fees, and were entitled in rotation to the post of High Sheriff, to which a good salary was attached. This office they usually farmed out to a deputy, and thus avoided the disagreeable duties it entailed. Then to be High Sheriff was to be high born".

John McIlhany's will was made March 27, 1773, and approved in court May 10, 1773. In signing it he spelled his name "McIlhaney", but the "e" has since been dropped. He mentions as legatees his wife Rosannah, his sons Thomas, James and John, and daughters Rachael, Mary and Hannah. His wife and son James were the executors of his will. I have not attempted to trace accurately the descendants of any of these children except James.

§113. Mr. J. Mortimer Kilgour is authority for the statement that the McIlhanys were originally Scottish Episcopalians, When they settled in upper Loudoun County, there was no church nearer to them than Leesburg, and hence there were really no church privileges for them to enjoy. When the Wesleyan movement began to spread in this country, the Rev. Robert Strawbridge (?), an Episcopal clergyman from Frederick, Md, joined in the movement and held revival services in an old brick school house at the place where Rehoboth Church now stands. Nearly all the McIlhany family, especially the girls, became interested in his preaching, and were really the organizers and builders of the Rehoboth church. It is not certain whether Mr. Strawbridge ever separated from the Church or not. Loudoun became the great stronghold of Methodism in Virginia. The best preachers came there, and the country was in a continual state of revival. While nearly all the family became Methodists, many have since returned to the Episcopal Church. None of the name remain in Loudoun County today.

A. THOMAS McILHANY was perhaps the oldest child. He is referred to as a witness in the Loudoun court on Oct. 15, 1766. He inherited from his father some property in Botetourt County; but as nothing further is known of him, he must have died young and unmarried.

- JOHN McILHANY, b. Jan. 15, 1756; d. Sept. 20, 1809. He is given in Heitman's Historial Register as a Captain in a Virginia State regiment in the Revolutionary War from April 1777 to May 1781. In the Revolutionary Records of the State Land Office there is a warrant, dated May 13, 1783, for 4000 acres of land to "Capt. John McIlhany for service rendered from April 1777 to May 1780". He never married. In his will made Sept. 18, 1809, and approved Oct. 9, 1809, he leaves almost his entire estate to his sister Hannah.

HANNAH McILHANY, b. in 1760; d. Dec. 14, 1839; m. June 16, 1812, William II. Parker (b. Jan. 12, 1759; d. Dec. 2, 1815). She had no children. She was a remarkable woman in many ways, and was always considered an authority in matters relating to the history of the family.

5114. JAMES McILHANY, son of John and Rosannah Stuart McIlhany, was born Sept. 22, 1749; d. "Ithaca", Sept. 17, 1804; m. in 1778, Mrs. Margaret Tribbey-Williams (b. Mar. 2, 1760: d. March 11, 1837). An obituary written at the time of his death says of him, that "the early part of his life was devoted to the pursuits of husbandry, and (after the death of his father) to the protection and support of his mother and her orphan children. At the age of twenty-five he joined the American Army, and assisted in avenging his country's wrongs. In the beginning his advantages of fortune and education were few, but nature had given him a mind of the first order, and formed in her finest mould, which afforded a wonderful instance of the power of native genius in rising to the highest degree of respectability when aided by unremitting perseverance and inflexible integrity. He lived as he died in peace with all his neighbors, beloved and respected by all who knew him".

His landed possessions were enormous. It is said that he owned 9000 acres of land in one body around the Short Hill, near Hillsboro, and extending as far as Lovettsville, and 4000 acres in another body on Goose Creek near Lincoln. He was a great business man, and would doubtless have been very wealthy, had he not died when still comparatively young. Each of his children is said to have received property valued at \$50,000.00. Shortly after his death his personal property alone was appraised at \$19,010.00.

His home near Hillsboro was called "Ithaca". The old mansion was long since destroyed by fire, and nearly all of his extensive possessions have passed out of the hands of the family. The household furnishings were massive and antique. The silver service was superb, some of it being still in the possession of his descendants. He spent a great deal of money on the education of his children. The best teachers available were

employed at his home continuously, and two of his three sons completed their education at Princeton.

In the burying ground at "Ithaca" at least twenty-two members of the family are interred. Not having been attended to for many years, the plot is now in wretched condition, and some of the inscriptions are almost illegible. But many of the dates given herewith were taken from these stones.

James McIlhany was prominent in many ways, his influence extending far beyond his own community. He sat on the bench of County Justices along with James Monroe and others, and later became High Sheriff of the County. In the Order Book under date of April 11, 1781 it was "ordered that James McIlhany, Gent, be paid Two Hundred Pounds of Tobacco according to Law for attending Court Eight Days as a Witness against the several non-conformists in his District".

\$115. The Records in the War Department state that "James McIlhany served as 1st lieutenant and captain, in the 5th, known also as the 9th Virginia Regiment, commanded by Col. Josiah Parker, Revolutionary War. His name appears on the rolls for the period from November 28, 1776, to May, 1778, on which he is reported as having been commissioned 1st lieutenant March 25, 1776, and he is reported on the muster and pay rolls of Capt. John Anderson's Company, same regiment, for June, 1778, with rank given as Captain, which roll shows that he resigned June 18. This roll is dated at Brunswick, July 5, 1778." See also Heitnian's "Historical Register", and the "Virginia Magazine of History and Biography", Vol. II, p. 250. In the Revolutionary Records in the State Land Office, Book 3, p. 345, under date of May 24, 1834, there is a warrant for 4000 acres of land issued to the heirs of James McIlhany, deceased, on account of his services as Captain in the Continental Line for three years. It has always been said that he was a Major in Morgan's rifle brigade, but I have been able to find no authority for this, except the mention of "Majr. McIlhaney" among the officers of Virginia troops listed in the "Virginia Magazine of History and Biography", Vol. VII, p. 27.

The wife of James McIlhany, Margaret Tribbey-Williams, was a daughter of John and Elizabeth Fabian Tribbey, who were living in Loudoun County as late as 1793. It is said that her parents immigrated to this country from Wales. They

were Quakers, but the family separated from that church on account of the Revolutionary War, several of the brothers being in the Continental Army. Her first husband was a Mr. Thomas Williams, by whom she had one son Uriah Williams, who died unmarried Sept. 25, 1804, aged 27 years. She was an elegant woman, tall and queenly looking, almost masculine in her strength of character and very pronounced in her religious views. She was remarkably intelligent and especially fond of history. It is related of her that she would often have some of her orphan grand-children roused at 4 o'clock in the morning to read Roman history to her. So advanced were her ideas that she became convinced very early that slavery was an evil, and accordingly freed all her slaves, sending them over the border to Pennsylvania.

## THE MILTON FAMILY.

\$144. On account of my inability to make the necessary re-Searches, it has been impossible for me to trace accurately the early history of the Milton Family in this country. Tradition says that Richard Milton, who came from England, was married in Penn-Sylvania to a Miss Ross of Scotland; that later he settled in Vir-I mia on the Potomac River; and that afterwards he removed to Prince William County, taking up lands on Bull Run. It is also said that his brother John, who came from England with him, removed about the same time to South Carolina. I find, however, that the county records, so far as examined, take the family back in Virginia at least one generation further than this. am certain that they came at first from England, but when they ame and where they first settled I have not been able to deterwine. Among the early land grants recorded in the State Land Office are several in 1636 and 1638 to Richard Milton at Westover in Charles City County, on the James River. While I have we proof of any connection, it is possible and even probable that he was the grandfather of the first Richard Milton mentioned below. In the half century following the time of these grants, a is se number of persons removed from that section to the more really opened lands in the central and northern parts of the State.

RICHARD MILTON and Eliza, his wife, were livered in Richmond County about the year 1720. The Parish Register contains the birth dates of at least three of their children;—Anne. b. August 31, 1720; Eliza, b. March 26, 1723; and Sarah, May 18, 1728. Their son Richard was born before these energy were made. On August 10, 1725 (Northern Neck Grants, week A, p. 165) a tract of 454 acres in "Stafford County on

Buc: Hall 'ranch of Occaquan' was granted to 'Richard Mel-Ton of Richm' County'. This part of Stafford County soon afterward became Prince William County. Here he died about the year 1733, his will of that date being mentioned in a deed; but the will-book containing it has been destroyed. From deeds retorded in the Prince William courthouse, it is seen that, besides his son Richard mentioned below, he had a son William, who also had a son William who died in 1777, leaving a wife named Fanny. I have not been able to discover the maiden name of Richard Milton's wife Eliza. It may be mentioned that in the early court records the name is spelled Melton as frequently as Milton.

\$145. Richard Milton, son of Richard and Eliza Milton, was born about 1715. He inherited from his father a tract of land "adjoining Coupers Cabin Branch" in Prince William County, where he lived and reared a family of nine children. His wife, whose name is mentioned in deeds along with his, was Margaret Ross. It is said that she came of a Scotch family of that name in Pennsylvania. Her grand-children remembered her as being tall, spare, and very neat in dress and appearance. She lived to be about ninety-five years of age, and when a very old lady she was still able to ride on horseback to the home of her son Elijah, making the distance of forty miles in one day. She was born about 1716 and died in 1811. Shortly after the Revolutionary War Richard Milton removed to Kentucky with his wife, his son Moses, and his married daughters, and settled on the Chaplin Fork of Salt River in Nelson County. Here he died about the year 1800. His nine children were,—

<sup>1740.</sup> His wife's name was Mary, as is shown by a deed of 1787 at the time of his removal to Kentucky. He lived to be a very old man. His numerous posterity are scattered throughout the States of the Middle West. The following outline, with the exception of the descendants of Alexander Ross Milton, was compiled by Rev. Charles L. Milton of Fort Scott, Kan., and I have not attempted to verify it in any particular.

He was "a man of strong self-reliance, fine moral character, great industry and enterprise". His broad fields of wheat and corn, and the large herds of cattle and sheep that grazed upon his meadows, indicated the success with which his "The Story of a Long Life", written labors were crowned. by his great-granddaughter, Harriot Milton Hammond, while

\$181. The following outlines are taken largely from a chart in the possession of Mr. Griffin Milton of Darlington, Md. I have added a few na nes and dates under the Taylor family, and have made several corrections and additions in other places, but have not attempted to verify the facts in every particular.

Richard Bushrod and Apphia his wife lived in Gloucester County, Virginia. He patented 4,000 acres of land in Westmoreland County in 1663. Their son,

John Bushrod, b. Jan. 30, 1663; d. Feb. 6, 1719, and is buried at the "Bushfield" estate, Westmoreland County, where his tomb may still be seen; m. ## Note 2. McCormick Family.

\$193. Dr. John McCormick, who emigrated to Virginia from Ireland between the years 1730 and 1740, was the founder of this family in America. In the Orange County records there is a deed under date of May 21, 1740 from Just Hite to "John McCarmick of Orange County" for 395 acres of land. Subseque tly he took up other grants adjoining this property, which was located in that part of Orange County that eventually became Jefferson County, W. Va. It was on this estate, near Summit Point, that in 1740 he built "The White House", which is still standing. "Weehaw" and "Upton" were a part of this property. He was a graduate in medicine of the University of Dublin, and brought with him to this country a large and valuable medical library, which was sold at his death to Dr. Cramer, then the leading physician of Charlestown. He was the most prominent physician in his neighborhood, and left a lasting impression upon the community in which he lived. He died in the year 1768, leaving a wife and eight children. His estate was In his will, made May 8, 1768 and reappraised Feb. S. 1769. corded Nov. 2, 1768, he mentions his wife Anne, his sons-James, John, Francis, William, George and Andrew, his "daughter dary Tate, wife to Magnus Tate", and his "daughter Jean Byren, wife to James Byrn". His wife and son James were the executors of his estate. It would seem that he was married before coning to this country; but the maiden name of his wife is unknown. The descendants of his eight children are scattered throug out many States, some of his sons having gone to Pennsylvania and some to the West. His daughter,

He was a large land owner, and each of his five sons who settled in Clarke County possessed a valuable farm. They were all men of great strength of character, energetic and enterprising. A short history of the family was published in 1890 in Mr. Norris's "History of the Lower Shenandoah Valley", from which some the facts given here have been derived, including the following two paragraphs.

"The early members of the McCormick family were singularly unobtrusive people, content in the happiness derived from their own family relations, being extremely clanish ...... Both the men and the women of the family....... were without guile, strictly honorable, affectionate, domestic and courteous. One of their marked characteristics was their great regard for the truth.

"One of the heir-looms of the family was an old English prayer book, from which much of the data in this article was gleaned. Unfortunately it was destroyed during the late War. This prayer book was given by Francis McCormick to his son Thomas McCormick at the time of his marriage; in it was a family tree on parchment, a very valuable and curious relic. One page represented Dr. John McCormick in a blue broadcloth suit with brass buttons; another, the marriage scene; and yet another, Anne McCormick with a blue bodice and yellow silk or satin skirt, with a branch of something in her hand and a bird;—ano her a death scene, coffin, etc., and a notice of dates, births and deaths beneath. The dates were all in 1700."

## THE ROGERS FAMILY.

\$206. In 1871 Mr. Arthur Lee Rogers (\$223) published a short "Sketch of the Rogers Family", the original draft of which was dated at Middleburg, July 10, 1853. He was always deeply interested in the early history of the family, and talked a great deal about it with his grandfather Hugh Rogers, with whom he was a special pet. As this sketch was written by him after a thorough examination of all the facts at his disposal, I cannot do better than quote here its opening paragraphs, with a few alterations.

"For my own satisfaction, as well as for the gratification of my relations on my father's side, I have, at leisure moments, collected from the most reliable sources the following Sketch of the Rogers Family. It has not been my purpose to manufacture for them a long and distinguished pedigree—for to such a distinction they lay no claim—but simply to state, in as few words as possible, such facts in my possession as may not be uninteresting to them and their descendants.

"I have learned from highly credible traditional authority, that the Rogers' now settled in Loudoun and adjoining counties in Virginia, are descended from a Presbyterian Scotch-Irish family, who resided in the county of Antrim, in the North of Ireland. And I find, from consulting the most approved works on Heraldry, that there was a family of that name in the said county in Ireland, who emigrated thither from Scotland about the middle of the sixteenth century. They are described as being 'Presbyterians, and bitterly opposed to the Roman Catholic faith'. They were not lords or princes, but are said to have been 'remarkably intelligent, highly respectable and moral people'. Some of them distinguished themselves in the wars against the Romanists; and



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it is related of the widow of a Captain William Rogers, who was killed in one of these contests, that she called a daughter, born shortly after his decease, Mailliw (his name transposed), she being determined that the child should bear the name of her devoted husband, whether boy or girl. Many of them were men of wealth, and, according to the custom of those days, they adopted a coat-of-arms and crest, on which was a spread-eagle and the motto, 'Justum perficito et nihil timeto'—act justly and fear nothing.''

"He died, loved, respected and lamented, alike by the friends whose affection had lasted more than three quarters of a century, and by those of a more recent date leaving a widow, with whom he had lived in unclouded harmony for three score years, and a family of ten children, fifty grand-children, and twenty-eight great-grandchildren, all living within an hour's ride.

"His was a most patriarchal character. Till lately his snow white hair was almost the only mark of age about him. Time seemed loth to lay his hand on so goodly and vigourous a frame; and the Destroyer left his heart wholly untouched, and as young as ever. Up to a short time before his death his practice was to visit his children regularly, the most distant thirty miles off, on horseback, and he was daily in the saddle or on foot, with a keen and sagacious interest in all that was going on about him. His health and elastic spirits never failed him until a few months ago, when he was prostrated by paralysis.

"He was a man of more than ordinary vigor and clearness of mind, possessing the gift, comparatively rare, of a sound and discriminating judgment. He was love able and hospitable. Excellent as a husband, father and master; of integrity, on which the length of nearly a cen-

tury left no stain, no breath of imputation. He stood up like a man, ever firmly for the right; and though having all those qualities, which fit a man to contend successfully with the world, his heart was never cankered by selfishness, but was ever ready to feel for the troubles, difficulties and distress of others, and his hand was ever open to assist and relieve them, wisely, gently and efficiently.

"Tho' always of moral deportment, he made no public profession of religion till late in life, when, a few years ago, he united with the Baptist church, and he ever afterwards lamented that he had not obeyed the Divine command by making a confession of his faith before the world at an earlier day."

§211. Mary Coombs, wife of Hugh Rogers, was the daughter of Samuel Coombs and Mary Chestnut of Loudoun County. There is a deed on record in the Loudoun court house, dated June 24, 1760, in which Samuel Coombs, who at that time leased "Catocti in Manour", is said to have been thirty years of age, his wife Mary Coombs twenty-seven years old, and his son Samuel Coombs aged one year. He was, perhaps, the son of Joseph Coombs of Overwharton Parish, Stafford County. One of his sons,—perhaps Samuel, born in 1759—, moved to Kentucky, and left a numerous posterity in that State, among whom we General Leslie Coombs.

"Mrs. Rogers had been a consistent member of the Baptist church for more than half a century, and the doctrine of Christ, which she adorned in her walk and conversation, and the hope which cheered her heart through so many years, did not fail to sustain and comfort her in the last hours of life ......

"She had reared a large family of sons and daughters to live and honor her through her long life, and many of her children and children's children were permitted to surround her dying bed and receive her parting blessing. Her numerous descendants, many of whom are now fighting the battles of their country, may well cherish the memory of this excellent woman, whose life was a connecting link between the first and second American revolutions, and who having outlived the Republic, whose birth she wit-

nessed, watched with deep interest and fervent prayers this second war of independence through which we are now passing."

The members of the early generations of the Rogers family were remarkable for their longevity. Hugh Rogers died in the eighty-sixth year of his age, and his wife in her eighty-eighth year. They had eleven children.—Elizabeth, Samuel, Hamilton. William, Asa, James, Sarah, Ann, Mary Jane, Martha and Susan. With the exception of Samuel, who died in infancy, these children averaged seventy-seven years of age, and five of them averaged eighty-six.
